TORY PAPER SPEAKS OUT

Not for years have the Canadian people been treated to such an exhibition of Tory absurdity as in the efforts of the Conservative press to excuse the Borden government for its refusal to touch the tariff. The Toronto Mail and Empire of October 6th capped the climax when it said: "Canada gets for nothing larger concessions than those for which much more than a fair equivalent was required under the reciprocity pact."

Could absurdity go further? The obvious inference is that the new U. S. tariff has been passed for the benefit of Canada and that Canada gives nothing in return. Instead it is plain to ordinary common sense that the Americans have not considered Canada. They have reduced the tariff in the interests of their own common people. The Borden government has kept up the tariff bars against the interests of our common people and in the interests of those whose wealth has been created by higher tariff conditions.

This specious foolery, however, was too much for the digestion of the Conservative Ottawa Citizen, which declared:

"President Woodrow Wilson has overthrown the outer stockade of special privilege of America. . . . The citizens of the republic have decided to cease taxing themselves by a customs tariff every time they import food stuffs. . . . The tariff will not be reduced in Canada. No concessions. What a triumph! Canadians will continue to tax themselves as usual. Certainly the U. S. grain consumers will take more Canadian grain and farm produce. But Canadians, generous people, will refuse to import anything in return. At most they will take as little as possible and will insist upon paying a tariff toll every time an exchange is made."

How long will the Canadian people tolerate such a condition? The problem still confronts the people. The Tory party is bound hand and foot to the special privilege classes. The Liberals are anxious to continue the policy of 1911 and ease the burdens of the Canadian people, as President Wilson and the Democrats have eased the burdens of the American people. Once the Canadian people face the issue, without being stampeded by the idiotic flag flapping campaign of the protected interests, and aware of the alliance between the jingo Tories and the Nationalists of Quebec, their answer will be swift and decisive.

Coun. Sloat of Bright deserves credit for putting through a resolution at the meeting of the N. B. Union of Municipalities, calling upon the Local government to increase the pay of jurymen from \$1 to \$2 per day. There is no good reason why jurors should not be decently paid for the important public service they are called upon to perform. Under the present law they are compelled to serve on juries for the sum of one dollar per day, which is insufficient to cover their actual expenses while away from home, and if they ignore the summons they are liable to a fine. This is neither British justice nor fair play. The law as it stands is a relic of past ages and should be changed. The Mail is hopeful that Dr. O. E. Morehouse, M. P. P., for York will at the next session of the legislative comes across with a bill entitled an act to increase the pay of jurymen and compel the government to pass it.

Speaking to a resolution commending the celebration of one hundred years of peace on this continent at the Presbyterian Synod meeting, Rev. Dr. Smith of this city said:

"I am opposed to war," he said, "because I do not believe in war, and I would like to see all the editors and those who are endeavoring to arouse the spirit of militarism in this land gathered together and blown off the face of the earth." It is needless to add that the resolution was adopted amid ringing cheers.

The St. John Standard and other Tory organs profess to be greatly amused over a statement made by

Hon. Dr. Pugsley in a newspaper interview in Toronto to the effect that if an election were called on now the Liberals would carry eleven seats in New Brunswick. The Tory organs seem to forget that the party so led by Hon. Dr. Pugsley carried eleven seats in this province in the general election of 1908 and they had Hon. Mr. Hazen and the local government arrayed against them.

Premier Flemming stated to a newspaper man in St. John yesterday that he was not satisfied with the progress being made with the work on the Suspension Bridge. The premier's candid opinion in regard to the progress being made on the Fredericton bridge would be interesting.

An elector in the county of Chatham, who was paid a wad of money for his vote by a Tory insider, was so worried over the incident that he turned the cash over to a friend. An elector of that kind would be quite a curiosity in some counties we could name.

The Municipal election in Westmorland County on Tuesday was run on party lines and resulted in a decisive victory for the Liberals. There is little hope for Toryism in Westmorland County at the present time.

DAMAGE BY FLOODS IN LOUISIANA

Lake Charles, La., Oct. 17.—Flood damage in Western Louisiana will reach several millions of dollars, it can be stated with certainty now that the waters have subsided sufficiently that a fairly accurate estimate can be made. The greatest money loss falls on the rice planters. The season had been ideal and the floods came just when harvesting was getting under way. Much rice in the shock was ruined as was the ripe rice still uncut. While the business districts of this and numerous other places were flooded there was ample time for merchants to move stocks so that this damage was negligible. The railways were heavy losers, as bridges and long sections of road bed were washed out. Considerable damage was also done to private property.
