STILL THREATENS

ACTION RE SCHOOL

Plumbing at High School Subject of Controversy--Test Not Made--
Plumbing Inspector Not Instructed to Act

The Journeymen Plumbers' Union is still dissatisfied with regard to the conditions at the High School, and claim that the plumbing done in that building is not in accordance with the Provincial Board of Health regulations. The union has secured counsel and intends to take legal action if unable to secure what it desires by other methods.

At the present time the situation with regard to the work is unsettled and the union is awaiting developments. If necessary an injunction to prevent the use of the building will be applied for.

CONVENTION

OF MUNICIPALITIES

GREAT SUCCESS

Delegates From City Returned Home Last Night--Address of R. B. Wallace Feature of the Gathering

The delegates from the City of Fredericton to the eighth annual convention of the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities returned home last evening from Moncton, where the convention was held on Wednesday and Thursday. They report the convention to have been one of the most successful that has been held, with very interesting papers and discussions.

R. B. Wallace of the Education Office, read one of the best papers ever heard at such a gathering. His subject was "Civics in the Schools." The paper elicited very favorable comment from those who heard it. Mr. Wallace did not return last evening, going on to Amherst to attend the Maritime Baptist Convention.

The rainy weather was one disagreeable feature of the convention, but it is said that apart from the rain, Moncton is very noticeably dry. Corkscrews were presented to some of the local delegates as being typical of a condition under which such implements were useless.

It had been expected that Fredericton would be the meeting place of the convention of 1914 but St. John was selected.

Delegates from Fredericton were City Clerk J. W. McCready, Ald. W. E. Farrell, Ald. Osborne, Ald. Mitchell. From York County the delegates were Warden Fawcett, Coun. Harry Smith, Coun. W. McMullin and Coun. Sloat. Sunbury was represented by Coun. George Perley, M.P.P.

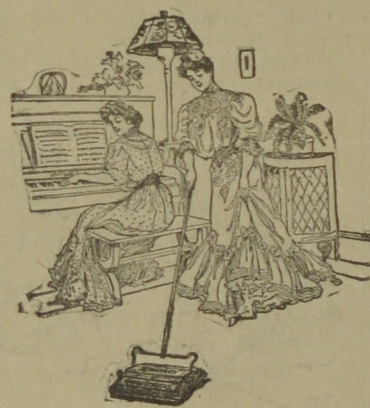
