Mail Adds Bring Results

DIAMOND JUBILEE OF THE CHRISTCHURCH CATHEDRAL

clergy of the diocese, with few exceptions, were in attendance. Of the clergy from abroad there were the Rt. Rev. the Bishop of Quebec and Toronto, the Rt. Rev. Bishop Southgate of the American church, several presbyters from Nova Scotia, Canada and the United States. Early in the morning the Royal Standard and other national flags were unfurled from the tower of the Cathedral and a peal was rung upon the bells. At 11 a.m. the procession was formed at the Province Hall (Parliament Building) and moved in order to the Cathedral. Included in the procession were members of the Legislature, officers of H. M. 76th Regiment then stationed at Fredericton, members of the Bench and Bar, wardens and vestrymen of the parish, the master-workmen of the building, the mayor and aldermen and citizens. Sixty-one of the clergymen in surplices, the architect of the edifice, Frank Willis Esq., the archdeacon, four bishops in their robes followed.

On entering the Cathedral grounds the clergy began to chant the 121st Psalm. When the procession reached the great west door it opened right and left and the bishops and clergy entered chanting the 24th Psalm, the choir and organ joining in at the 7th verse, "Lift up your heads, O ye gates." The Bishop of Fredericton proceeded to his stall on the south side of the choir. The other bishops occupied three sedilia in the sacristy and the deacons and presbyters were ranged on either side of the chancel.

A beautiful voluntary was performed upon the organ by Mr. Hayter of Boston, who presided at the organ during the whole of the four days' services. The consecration office was then commenced by the bishop. After the consecration prayers the sentence of consecration engrossed on parchment, signed and sealed by His Lordship the Bishop, was read by the Rev. Frederick Coster, rector of Carleton. From that document it appeared that the building was to be used as Cathedral of the diocese and parish church and that the seats except one for the Lieutenant Governor were to remain forever free and misappropriated.

Rev. Mr. Pofmore, curate of St. Anne's Chapel, Fredericton, then commenced morning prayer. The Vespers was chanted, followed by the 136th Psalm. Rev. Dr. Haight of New York, read the first lesson and the Te Deum was sung.

Rev. Wm. Q. Ketchum, curate of Fredericton, then read the second lesson. The Litany was said by Rev. Dr. Euson of Lowell, Mass. At the close of Morning Prayer, the consecration hymn was sung by thirty children and the choir.

The anti-Communion service was then commenced by the bishop of the diocese. The responses in the decalogue were sung to music composed by Chief Justice Carter of New Brunswick. The epistle was read by the Lord Bishop of Toronto and the gospel by the Lord Bishop of Quebec. The sermon was preached by the Rt. Rev. Horatio Southgate, D.D., late Foreign Missionary Bishop of the American church to Turkey and at that time rector of the Church of the Advent, Boston. His text was Psalm

CXXII, 8 and 9.

After the sermon the offertory sentences were read by the Rev. William Harrison, rector of Portland. The offertory at this and subsequent services amounted to \$1,320.25. Ven. Archdeacon Coster then proceeded with the communion service. The absolution was pronounced by the bishop of the diocese, who delivered communion to the bishop and other clergy taking part in the service. The four bishops, assisted by Rev. James Dixon Carder of Connecticut, Rev. T. R. Lambert, chaplain U. S. Navy; Rev. Dr. Alaz of St. Andrew's, and Rev. W. E. Scovil of Kingston, then administered the sacrament to the others. The post-communion prayers were said by the Bishop of Quebec and the blessing was pronounced by the Bishop of Fredericton.

OTHER SERVICES.

On the following day the bishop held his triennial visitation in the Cathedral. In the evening another service was held in the church. On Friday morning a business session was held and in the evening another service was held, after which addresses were presented to the Bishop of Quebec and Toronto and Bishop Southgate and also to the Bishop of Fredericton. The four days' services were concluded on Sunday.

AROUND THE MARKET.

Considering the state of the weather there was a fair sized market this morning and a large quantity of farm produce was disposed of. The fire-stalling brigade was well represented and were able to get in their work where the police were not looking. Potatoes were quite plentiful and sold at 75 cents per half barrel. Lamb sold at \$1 and \$1.25 per quarter. Fowls and chickens sold at \$1 per pair. Butter was scarce at 23 cents and there was also a scarcity of eggs. Apples were plentiful at \$1 per bushel. High bush cranberries brought 25 cents per pail and blackberries sold at 15 cents a box. Carrots sold at five cents per bunch, beans and peas at 25 cents per peck and cucumbers at 3 cents each.
