## COMISKEY TO TAKE O'BRIEN OF THE MARATHONS

Jacobson and Dederich Likely to go to Lynn--St. John Players Will Leave for Their Homes

(St. John Telegraph.)

Three or possibly more of the players of the Marathon and Fredericton teams have a chance to continue playing baseball after the close of the season here on Labor Day. President Fraser of the Lynn Club, has written to Manager Leonard, telling him that, following the disbanding of the league, there might be a chance for some of the players with his team. He mentioned Jacobson, O'Brien and Dederich and the chance to continue in active ball-playing for a few weeks more may possibly appeal to them. Last night Manager Leonard of the Marathons, said that O'Brien would likely be given a chance by Comiskey in the big league.

There will be no more professional ball here after Labor Day. Two games will be played between the locals and the capitals on that day, the one in the morning at ten o'clock so that an opportunity will be given to see the parade, which will not pass the Marathon grounds before noon. Tarbell and Howard will probably be the pitchers.

After Labor Day the players will leave for their homes. With the exception of our "Buff" Riley, all belong in the States and their homes are quite widely scattered. White of the catching staff, belongs to Boston, while Flaherty's home is in Winchester. Conley and Walter Bien, catcher for the greater part of the season, belong to Philadelphia. "Dutch" Howard's home is in Portland, Me., but he has a bowling alley at Newport, Me., which demands his attention in the winter season. Joe Tarbell, who has been one of the Marathon's steadyest in the pitching staff all season, will go to his home in Hogsburg, N.Y., while Shankey, the big first baseman, will leave for his home in Barrytown, N.Y. Pinkerton, the speedy second sacker, will go back to Sanford, Me. Waterhouse, who got through his school course last spring, will probably join his father in the latter's shoe business in Swampscott. Parker will go to his home in Bath, Me., while Jacobson, whose home is in New Britain, Conn., may go to Lynn for a couple of weeks. O'Brien will do likewise, unless it interferes with his studies at Tufts' Dental College.

## PETS LOST IN TENTH INNING AT ST. JOHN

Bob Conley Made Poor Throw Which Let in Winning Run--Score 3 to 2--Fast and Exciting Game

St. John, Aug. 30.—There was a fair crowd of people at the North End grounds yesterday afternoon to witness the Marathons defeat the Fredericton team in a ten inning hard fought game with a score of three to two. It was a pitchers' battle throughout between Tonley of the Greeks and Dederich for Fredericton and although eight singles were made off each pitcher and the majority of these hits were infield ones, Conley had the better of the fight, having struck out ten men against two struck out by Dederich. In a number of cases the errors made by the players were almost excusable. Conley, the Fredericton third baseman, in the last inning threw slightly wild to Bien on first, causing that player to reach off the base to catch the ball with the result that the batter was safe and Conley, the Greeks' twirler, was enabled to bring in the winning run.
