**INJUNCTION RE YORK STREET SCHOOL WILL BE SOUGHT**

Journeymen Plumbers' Union Determined to Fight Matter of Alleged Improper Plumbing--Counsel Coming From Toronto Tuesday

The next chapter in the discussion on the sanitary improvements at the York Street School building, it is reported today, will be the application on behalf of the Jurymen Plumbers' Union, No. 517, for an injunction to prevent the School Board of Fredericton from using the building for school purposes until the plumbing recently completed there complies with the regulations of the Provincial Board of Health. It is understood that the application will be made on Tuesday next, Monday being a public holiday. The local Plumbers' Union has obtained legal advice in this city and also will have the assistance of counsel from Toronto sent here by union headquarters. The Toronto lawyer is expected to arrive on Tuesday.

It is said that the local union plumbers will fight the matter to the end, their content on being that the Board of Health regulations were not complied with inasmuch as plans of the improvements were not filed with the Plumbing Inspector by the architect, Mr. F. Neil Brodie of St. John, that the Plumbing Inspector has not given a certificate of test in compliance with Provincial Board of Health regulations and that the local Board of Health had no right to pass the work in view of the action of Plumbing Inspector George Edney.

**BULGARIAN SAYS TURKS ROBBED HIM**

Laborer on Smith & Merrithew Contract Says \$100 Was Taken From Him--Case Reported to Authorities

A miniature Balkan trouble is reported from Kelly's Creek, Parish of Kingsclear, about sixteen miles from Fredericton, a Bulgarian laborer on the sub-contract of Smith & Merrithew on the St. John & Quebec Railway, reporting to the authorities that two Turks also employed as laborers on the line, had robbed him of one hundred dollars. The man at first informed the members of the office staff of Smith & Merrithew of what had occurred, but his lack of the English language made it difficult for him to explain the details. The matter was finally placed before Mr. George McEwen, justice of the peace, and Constable John Elliott is looking for the accused men.

The robbery took place Thursday night. The Bulgarian was walking alone when accosted by the others. They attacked and overpowered him and while one held his arms the other searched his clothing and took the money.

York Street School and four of the Fredericton High School have accommodation in the building. The Board of Health acted as it did on the matter on the understanding that the work was satisfactory and it is claimed by some that it is.
