CROTHERS VIEWS ON COST OF LIVING

Halifax, Dec. 8—"To my mind the high cost of living, is an indication

of the prosperity and expansion of this country," declared Hon. T. W. Crothers, minister of labor, in the course of an address on labor conditions in Canada at the business men's luncheon at the Queen hotel today.

"I do not profess to be an expert, but, in my opinion the reason of the high cost of living is that there is a smaller percentage of people tilling the soil than ever there has been before. The supply is not equal to the demand, and consequently the prices go up.

"If you want cheap living let's have a few years of hard times."

Mr. Crothers said that he did not like the term minister of labor. He preferred to be called minister of play. The word "labor" was associated with hard work, toil, drudgery and excessive muscular exertion.

He was glad there was no labor trouble in Nova Scotia. All should discourage industrial war. War should be confined to the brute crea-

"Militarism," that military tyranny which was the curse of Europe has no attraction for me, or I hope for Canadians. It is contrary to the genius and education of our people. Militarism cannot thrive in Canada amidst such conditions as are common to our land. And as it is with militarism so it was with the industrial war."

Mr. Crothers paid a tribute to the efficacy of the public utilities act. There had been thirty-four commissions in two years and only two strikes, a pretty good record, he thought.

In discussing the big bunch of bills submitted and criticising the items in some of them, it was suggested that after all the plumbers are not the only citizens whose figures shock the recipient.

No further action was taken looking toward the enlargement of accommodation at the hospital as it is felt no work could with advantage, be undertaken before the spring. While the hospital is a great boon to the public, there are times when its convenience and comfort have to be denied to applicants for admission. Today and on recent occasions patients are occupying the wards because there is no private room available. The lack of a maternity department is a great drawback to the success of the hospital and a few days ago an applicant had to take a train to another town because she could not receive treatment in Fredericton. No doubt with the co-operation of a generous public, these drawbacks will some day be removed.

S.P.C.A. WORK.

Dr. Mullin worked upon the sympathy of the members in respect to the necessity for the re-organization of a S.P.C.A. in Fredericton in order that a shelter for physician's horses should be provided at the hospital. The mayor and other members saw the urgent need of such a society that somebody said a shelter at the hospital was for years unused because the doctors would not go to the rear of the building to hitch his horse, when his groom could keep him on the move outside. As Mr. James Roberts is the only visible head of the society in this section of the province, he may have something to say on the matter.

In view of the large monthly expenditure for laundry work it was suggested that the board construct a laundry in connection with next spring's improvement.

The meeting was then adjourned.

The remains will be taken to the C.P.R. train Thursday morning and interment will be made at St. John.

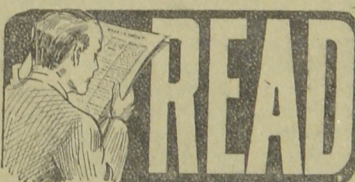
