TEN PER CENT DUTY ON POTATOES ALMOST NOTHING

Uncertainty Concerning Countervailing Duties Clause is Settled--Many Potatoes Now Ready for Shipment to United States

The announcement that the new United States tariff imposes an ad valorem duty of ten per cent. upon potatoes shipped from Canada has caused great satisfaction to the farmers and produce-shippers of this section of New Brunswick and many exportations of potatoes is expected to begin at once. This duty amounts to almost nothing, ten cents per barrel when the prevailing price is \$1 per barrel, not being sufficient to overcome the advantage which New Brunswick would have over other potato-exporting countries. Large quantities of potatoes are now in cars at the C.P.R. yards and more will come in from the surrounding country when the shippers want them.

In the minds of some an uncertainty seems to exist with regard to the "countervailing duties" clause in the new tariff. At present Canada imposes a duty of 20 cents per bushel upon potatoes imported from the United States. By some it is contended that the 10 per cent. ad valorem duty under the new tariff is to be additional to a specific duty equivalent to the duty imposed by Canada. United States Consular Agent W. W. Heard informed The Mail today that such contention was wrong, the new duty being a straight ad valorem duty of ten per cent. Under the terms of the "countervailing duties" clause of the new tariff if Canada should remove the duty of 20 cents per bushel Canadian potatoes will

Two drunks were arrested Saturday night and obtained their liberty by making deposits.

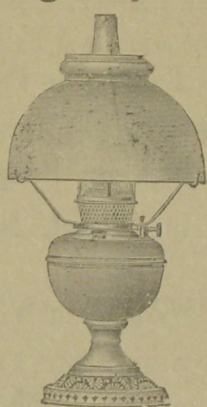
