RICHMOND FAST MAN OF DALHOUSIE HALF DIVISION

Is Using Hurdling This Year---Yellow and Black Team About the Same As That of 1912

Dalhousie narrowly escaped defeat at the hands of the Wanderers on Saturday last. Stan Bauld, the veteran half-back of the Wanderers, dropping for goal and missing a score of inches only. Had the ball crossed the bar the score would have stood, Wanderers 7, Dalhousie 6.

The Halifax Recorder hands out the following on the Dalhousie team, which is to play U.N.B. here on Monday next:

"Dalhousie has its team of last year, practically, in fact, with the exception of the three quarters, who are all new to the game. One of them, Stultz, is a particularly good player; he is quick, active, uses good judgment, gets away fast and will keep his opponents busy watching him. Graham and Fraser are both players of promise. Campbell again played strongly at full back. The half line is a good combination, with Richmond for speed, Johnston and Meek not so far behind him in this respect, with Graham for the sturdy work. The latter made a number of splendid plays, which were of great advantage to his team. Richmond made a number of good plays and fine runs which brought the stand to their feet. He tried his hurdling on one occasion but escaped a bad toss. Johnston played a strong game; he took the ball quickly; he made a number of fine dashes, particularly near the line, and he got Dalhousie's first try in this manner. Meek shows much improvement over last season and did a lot of excellent work. Captain Pines and his forwards played a strong game, with much system in their work."

MONTREAL ENGLISH RUGBY MEN TO PLAY AT NEW YORK

Team Will Visit United States at Christmas---Game Getting Strong Foothold at Montreal

(Montreal Herald.)

The English Rugby circles of New York State are likely to be invaded about Christmas time by a representative team of picked men from the six teams of English Rugby players in Montreal.

The Rugby Union here have just got under way with their fixture card, but by the end of the season, when men have come to know each other better and have a better understanding of each other's play, it is predicted that such a representative team would be a very strong combination and a dangerous opponent to any contestants.

Overtures have been made on the part of Montreal to the New York authorities, but apart from a willingness on the part of the southerners to entertain the local enthusiasts, nothing definite has been reached.

The local team are out for a guarantee which is somewhat slow in being picked. It is expected, however, that in a few weeks all arrangements will have been completed for the tour.

A representative team of the local Union will meet McGill on Thanksgiving morning. The game will be taken as a test as to the ability of the men of the various teams to work together.

"We have before another year passes to send a team over to the Old Country, not to take on International games, but to play friendly matches with the leading clubs. We have many good men and possibly the best is W. Hutchinson (W. R. Hutchinson of Glasgow High School, F.P.) who played for Scotland against England in 1911," said a well known local Rugby official today.

PING BODIE GETS HIS BONUS FROM CALLAGHAN

White Sox Manager Relents and That Single Beer Does Not Count Against Bodie

Chicago, Oct. 14—Happiest among the lot of happy White Sox today was Frank "Ping" Bodie. In addition to his city series split of \$807.22, Bodie received a bonus of \$600 that he had given up as gone forever.

New York, Oct. 16—For the fourth time with in the past five years Tommy Murphy and Packey McFarland, two of the best fighters in the light-weight division, are to come together tomorrow night in an endeavor to settle the question of supremacy. The bout will be a ten-round affair and will be staged by the Garden A. C. of this city. The record of their previous fights show that honors were even in the first two. In the third bout, which was a twenty-round affair in San Francisco, McFarland was returned the winner.

The bridegroom was attended by Capt. Gus Welch of the Indian football eleven, and the bride's maid of honor was Miss Margaret Chisholm of Oklahoma. The ushers were students at the Indian school.

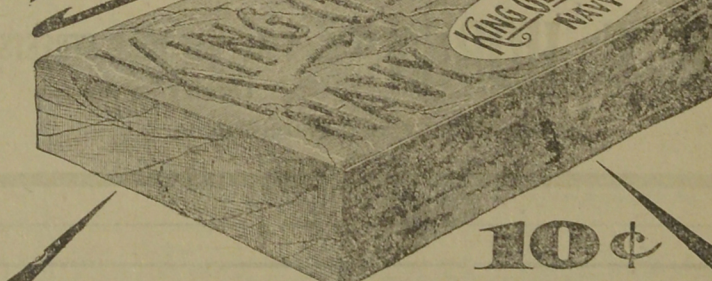
