## Frank Patch Won 2.14 Pace In Straight Heats

**CARL WALKER  
STAYED WITH PRO  
WRESTLER LAST NIGHT**

Local Man Showed He Had Something  
---Frank West, Principal Wrestler  
Appeared Here Two Years Ago

Frank West's wrestling show which is one of the Midway attractions at the Fredericton Exhibition, got a big boost last night when Carl Walker of this city, won the five dollars offered by the management of the show to any person who could stay with Gene Westergard or Frank West for five minutes. Walker went on against Westergard and went the limit to the great delight of a good-sized crowd.

Arrangements have been made for other local men to go on with the professionals. Parker of the Provincial Normal School, is to try tonight. News of Walker's success last night spread rapidly through the fair grounds. Future matches with local men appearing are sure to be well patronized.

### HAS BEEN HERE BEFORE.

Frank West, who is the principal wrestler of the show, is not a stranger to Fredericton, having appeared at the City Opera House a couple of seasons ago when an effort was made to give wrestling a foothold here. At that time West came here under the name of Billy Kolb, the wrestler who was to fill the engagement not coming. He went up against a young Scotch wrestler named Sandy McLeod, who had just come to Canada. McLeod had a big advantage in weight and beat Kolb after a hard match. West was brought here by J. J. Sayre of Moncton, wrestling promoter. He afterward had financial trouble with Sayre.

### WOMAN WRESTLER.

The wrestling show is under the direction of Mr. Henry Meyerhoff of New York, who has charge also of the Amusement Hall attractions and the outdoor free exhibition acts. Miss Harris, champion lady wrestler of the world, who defeated Miss Cera Livingston in New York last spring, is the headliner of the show. The other lady wrestler who appeared with her having left the show soon after its arrival here, she wrestles with Young McDonald, a very skillful wrestler but of light weight.

Halifax Stallion Had Things His Own Way--  
Best Time 2.14 1-2--  
Colt Races Proved very Interesting--Both Won in Straight Heats--Upton Prince Won Two-Year-Old Trot and Draws Three-Year Old Trot

Frank Patch won the 2:14 Pace and 2:11 Trot of the Exhibition Meet yesterday in straight heats and without any trouble. This had been expected. The forecast that Frank Patch would also jar the new track record of 2:13 put up by Dingola on Monday was not fulfilled. The Patch horse did not have to go faster than 2:14 to win. Second money in this race went to Dimple K. This mare was second twice. In the third heat Laura Merrill was driven a great race and was a good second, qualifying for third money.

### GREAT RECORD.

Mr. P. H. Reed of Fort Fairfield, Me., owner of Dimple K, stated yesterday that his mare had been in fifty three races and had been within the money in every race and had won forty-three. Mr. Reed probably will let the mare rest next season, not racing here. He may also breed her.

### THE COLT RACES.

Both the colt races were won in straight heats. The Three-Year-Old Trot was won by Bravos, another horse owned by Mr. P. H. Reed. Barling's Comet of W. H. Musgrave's stable, Halifax, was expected to make a good showing in this race but was drawn, having hurt himself in his stall. Second money went to James W. McKinney, owned by H. J. Morgan of this city. Bravos had both heats won easily.

Four colts came out for the Two-Year-Old Trot. Upton Prince, a Charlottetown colt, won in two straight heats and had little trouble doing it. Hamilton G. Kitchen's Ohutta and Herb Morgan's Stella Vincent divided second money. Martin was fourth. In the second heat he was set back to last place because of breaking.

### RACE OF DAY.

The 2:14 Pace and 2:11 Trot was the race of the day. Frank Patch had been considered so likely to win that he had been barred in the pools. The others furnished the excitement, however. Dimple K and Laura Merrill fought it out for second and third. The Maine horse was second in two heats but Tommy Raymond changed matters in the third. He kept the mare well up and on coming into the stretch drove wide and let Laura out. She came up in a way that made it look as if she was going to challenge Frank Patch and was second in the best finish of the afternoon.
