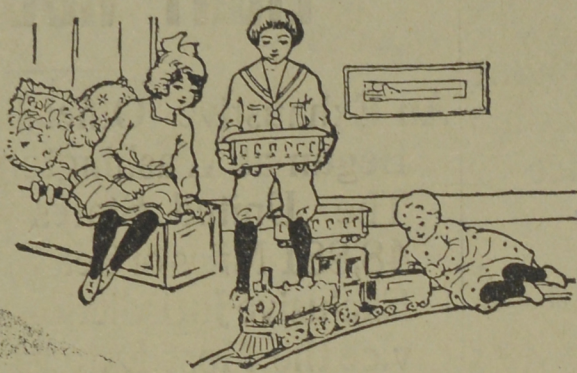

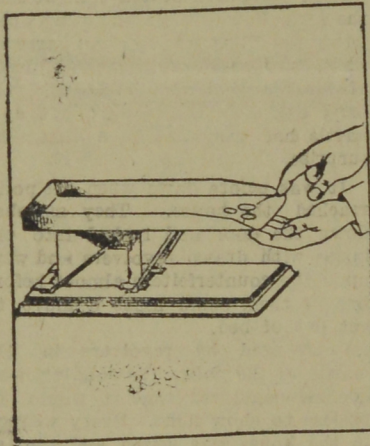

### CASH DELIVERER

Coins Laid on Chute and Tilted Into  
Customer's Hand

It is rather surprising the number of devices patented for the purposes of delivering change into a person's hand. A man has designed a little chute for this purpose. A chute is mounted on movable links

rising from a comparatively heavy base. When the coins are placed in this chute it is tilted forward and the change is slid neatly into the customer's hand, no clanging of the counter is necessary. After this operation is performed the chute automatically flies back into place, owing to a spring attachment, and is ready for the next visitor.

### Where No Money is Used

The Island of Ascension, in the Atlantic Ocean, is of volcanic formation, and has a population of only 450. It was uninhabited until the confinement of Napoleon at St. Helena, when it was occupied by a small British force.

Ascension is governed by a captain appointed by the British Admiralty. There is no private property in land, no rents, no taxes, and no use for money. The flocks and herds are public property and the meat is issued as rations. So are the vegetables grown on the farms. When an island fisherman makes a catch he brings it to the guard-room, where it is issued by the sergeant-major. Practically the entire population are sailors and they work at most of the common trades. The muleteer is a Jack Tar; so is the gardener; so are the shepherds, the stockmen, the groomers, masons, carpenters and plumbers. The climate is almost perfect and anything can be grown.

### CARVING CAMEOS

This Delicate Process Was Not Known  
to the Ancient Greeks and Romans

The carving of shell cameos is a comparatively modern art. The Greeks and Romans, although they made cameos out of layered agate, knew nothing about shell carving, possibly because the Mediterranean did not supply suitable shells. When such carving first came into vogue, many different kinds of shell were tried, but all were found faulty because of size, color or lack of permanence except one variety of the hermit shell. Of this variety, only one out of many shells is fit to use because the making of a cameo demands a strong, evenly colored under layer, a solid outer layer and sufficient usable surface.

The process of carving the shell requires great skill and delicacy. If the shell is to be carved as a whole, the artist takes advantage of the fact that the coloring of the lower layer is richest next the mouth of the shell and the ridges on the last whorl are thick enough to permit deep carving. For commercial purposes the shell is usually cut into pieces with a tin wheel, running water and emery powder.

The piece that is to be carved has to be shaped with a small grindstone and the surface has to be smoothed and cleared of imperfections. A piece of paper cemented to the back keeps the shell from cracking and is used for fastening a working handle to the cameo.

After the design has been drawn on the outer surface with a pencil it is cut in the soft white outer layer with steel engraver's (much like a wood engraver's) tools. The naturally colored inner layer, which becomes the background, requires polishing and developing with pumice and acid, rubbed in with a boxwood stick.

The whole process must be carried out with great care, because the shell is very fragile and can easily be broken or corroded by the acid used in polishing.

## INDIAN TOTEMS AND TOTEM POLES

The Indian Has a Great Respect For  
His Totem to Which He Thinks  
He is Related

The Indians of the Pacific coast believe themselves to be related to animals, thus the Turtle Clan of the Iroquois are descended from a fat turtle, which, burdened by the weight of its shell in walking, contrived by great exertions to throw it off, and thereafter gradually developed into a man. The Cray-Fish Clan of the Choctaws were originally cray-fish.

Believing himself to be descended from and therefore akin to his totem, the savage naturally treats it with respect. If it is an animal he will not kill nor eat it, except when hunger compels, and then they express their sorrow for having to eat their friends and relatives. If it is a plant he will not cut nor gather it.

The Elk Clan of the Omahas neither eat the flesh nor touch any part of the male elk, and think that if any of their tribe did so, he would break out in boils. The Deer-Head Clan of the Omahas may not touch the skin of any animal of the deer family, nor wear moccasins of deerskin, nor use the fat of the deer for hair-oil; but they may eat the flesh of deer.

The relation between a man and his totem is one of mutual help and protection, and an animal is supposed never to harm any member of a tribe whose totem he is. In order to put himself more fully under this protection, the clansman is in the habit of dressing in the skin of his totem, arranging his hair and mutilating his body so as to resemble it as much as possible; or he will have a picture of his totem tattooed on his body.

Amongst the Indians of British Columbia the totem is sometimes painted on the person of the clansman, and he always affixes his totem mark as a signature to treaties, and paints or carves it on his weapon, hut and canoe, much as in civilized nations, crests and coat of arms distinguish writing paper, private carriages and silverware.

Besides the clan totems there are individual ones. The first animal of which an Indian youth dreams during long and solitary fasts, becomes his totem. He then kills the animal or bird of which he dreams, and wears its skin or feathers as an amulet.

So in the carved and painted poles we see on the Pacific coast the dominating figure represents the totem belonging to the tribe or to the individual and the other carvings represent historical events. Totem poles are usually constructed of solid cedar trunks from one to five feet in diameter, and from five to sixty feet high; they are carved with highly conventionalized animals and figures, and are usually painted in gaudy colors, particularly green, red and yellow.

### FIRST WHEAT EXPORTED

Shipment of Less Than 1,000 Bushels  
Was Sent From Manitoba

On Oct. 21, 1876, the first commercial shipment of wheat out of Manitoba was made from Winnipeg. The shipment was made by the pioneer merchants of Winnipeg, Higgins and Young, and the 857 1-6 bushels of hard wheat shipped to Steele Brothers, seedsmen of Toronto, was for seed purposes. The price paid in Winnipeg was 80 cents per bushel.

It took a number of farmers in that day to make up a shipment that would be considered hardly worth the while of any modern Manitoba farmer. The wheat was collected in small quantities from farmers in several districts near Winnipeg and sacked by Higgins and Young.

The invoice, in the fine copper-plate hand-writing of David Young, is dated Oct. 12, 1876, indicating that the shipment was made up and ready for shipment several days before it was actually started on what was then the long journey to Toronto. The freight rate on that day was just 35c cents per bushel.

### American Sponge Fisheries

While sponge fishing in the Americas is rather a modern industry, it produces more than two-thirds of the world's supply in weight. The fisheries of the Mediterranean now produce about one-half of the world's supply in value. Sponge fishing is believed to be most highly developed at Tarpon Springs, Florida, and Batabano, Cuba. As early as 1823 the inhabitants of Key West, Florida, learned from specimens thrown up on the beaches of the presence of several species of useful sponges. For some time they were limited to domestic use among the inhabitants, but not until 1849 was a cargo sent to New York.

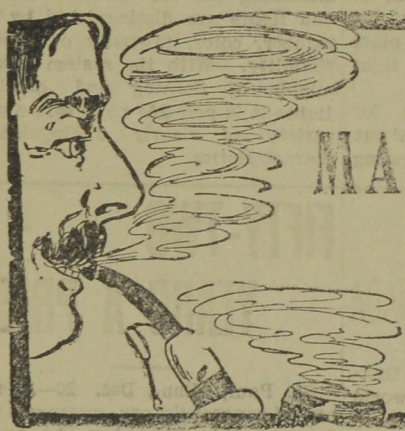
### Canada Attracts Investors

A leading Canadian financial publication estimates that there is now at least \$599,000,000 of United States capital invested in Canada. Over \$150,000,000 is in the shape of branch factories and warehouses of United States manufacturers, while nearly \$124,000,000 is invested by residents of the United States in Canadian government, municipal and industrial bonds. United States life and fire insurance companies have \$67,000,000 invested in the Dominion, while over \$130,000,000 is invested in British Columbia mills, lumber and mines.

Investments in the prairie province are in lands, mines, packing plants, factories and warehouses.

### Japanese Thrift

In Japan examples of thriftiness are amazing. On account of the rapidly growing population the people cannot afford to waste the value of a straw. Even the seaweed and octopus serve for food. Hillsides that would be given up in Canada as absolutely untillable have been converted into rice fields in forty irrigated terraces rising above each other on a single slope and made permanent by walls of masonry. If there is no water, it can be carried to the topmost terrace of the farmers, and if the hillside is rocky, even soil itself may be taken from some distant deposit to the terrace.
