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### CHARLEY WHITE HAD BETTER OF AD WOLGAST

Winner Made Brilliant Showing at Milwaukee---Wolgast Improved as Bout Progressed

Milwaukee, Wis., Dec. 19—Charley White of Chicago, by brilliant boxing and hard fists, snatched Ad Wolgast of Cadillac, Mich., in their ten-round no-decision boxing contest here tonight. The contest was one of the best ever seen here.

The first round was even. White did most of the landing, but no damage was done by either man. The second round was also even, each landing heavily. Wolgast several times sent hard rights and lefts to the body, but White always came back with a blow to the face.

White took a big lead in the third, raining lefts and rights to Wolgast's face and body almost at will. The former champion appeared to be worried by the heavy onslaught. Wolgast landed only twice during the round. Wolgast appeared to be tiring in the fourth round, although at times he bored in and landed heavily on White's body.

The fifth round opened with Wolgast forcing White to the ropes, but doing little damage. White almost sent his opponent through the ropes after a series of hard lefts and rights to the face, but Wolgast came back at all times, playing for his opponent's body.

The sixth round was Wolgast's. He did most of the leading, several times having White against the ropes, sending rights and lefts to the body and head. The round was a vicious one, White being worried at the close.

The seventh round was even. The men fighting viciously at all times. White had a slight lead.

Wolgast was clearly tired in the ninth. When the gong sounded the men were on the ropes, fighting viciously, and had to be separated by the referee and forced to their corners.

The tenth was vicious, each apparently striving for a knockout. Wolgast forced White to the ropes several times but White fought cleverly, using his left to great advantage on Wolgast's face. When the round ended they were fighting hard and the round ended even.

### INTERCOLLEGIATE HOCKEY MEETING ON MONDAY

Capt. Melanson Will Represent U. N. B.—Red and Black Wants Two Games Here Early in February—Six-Men Hockey Also Will be Asked For

Capt. Walter Melanson of the University of New Brunswick hockey team, will represent his college at the annual meeting of the Maritime Intercollegiate Hockey League at St. John on Monday next, December 22. The Red and Black wants a schedule which will have King's College and Acadia play here in the first part of February and U.N.B. to play Mount Allison at Sackville after that. It is thought that this schedule can be arranged all right.

Capt. Melanson also will attempt to have hockey of the six-men variety introduced into the league in place of the seven-men game. He is in hopes that King's College will support him in this. In certain quarters it is considered doubtful if the change will be made.

The prospective members of the U.N.B. hockey squad have been instructed to take up training during the Christmas recess and it is expected that when practice begins in January the squad will be in good condition. Some new material will be added to the Red and Black squad. The material now available includes the bulk of last year's team and some players from the Interscholastic League.

### NEW STRENGTH RECORD

Philadelphia, Dec. 19—What is claimed to be a world's record for strength tests were made today by Michael Dorzias, a Greek athlete, who is a student at the University of Pennsylvania, when he registered a total of 1,800 kilograms on the standard machines in the University gymnasium.

Dr. R. T. McKenzie, the physical director, who witnessed the tests, declared that in his opinion Dorzias is the strongest man in the world.

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### TWO JOHNSONS IN PHONY BOUT AT PARIS CROWD BAD HUMORED

Paris, Dec. 19—Jack Johnson, the heavyweight champion, and Battling "Jim" Johnson, another colored pugilist, of Galveston, Texas, met in a ten-round contest here tonight, which ended in a draw. The spectators loudly protested throughout that the men were not fighting and demanded their money back. Many of them left the hall.

The organizers of the fight explained the fiasco by asserting that Jack Johnson's left arm was broken in the third round.

There is no confirmation of a report that Jack Johnson had been stabbed and no evidence at the ringside of such an incident. During the first three rounds he was obviously playing with his opponent. After that it was observed he was using only his right hand.

When the fight was over he complained that his arm had been injured.

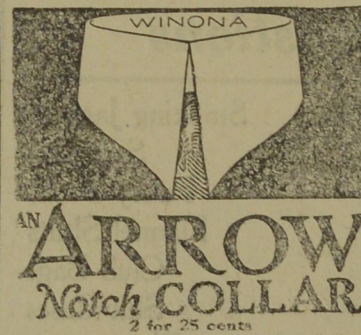
Doctors who made an examination reported a slight fracture of the radius of the left arm. The general opinion is that his arm was injured in wrestling match early in the week and that a blow tonight caused a fracture of the bone.

### WANDERERS INSURE PLAYERS AGAINST ACCIDENT

The Wanderer management have insured all of their players for this season against accident and death. The amount of compensation ranges all the way from \$3,000 to \$500 for a disabled limb. The company taking the risk recedes the consideration of \$300. This is the first time that the players have been insured against all possible injuries and loss of life.

### AMMONIA POURED DOWN HOCKEY PLAYER'S THROAT

In a rough game on the coast the other night, Bobby Rowe was knocked cold for a considerable period by a collision with Ernie Johnson. He struck the ice with his head and was carried off the ice unconscious. When he was being revived somebody stuck an ammonia bottle in his mouth and today Bobby will have difficulty in eating because of the burns. He revived, however, after this heroic treatment and went back on the ice in the final period. In the same game Ernie Johnson received a nasty gash over his right eye that called for several stitches. Tommy Dunderdale had his nose broken with a swing from a stick and Ken Mallen was tossed heavily to the ice by Bobby Genge, while Rowe sent Charlie Tobin into a post and gave the Westminster point player a nasty jar. Genge was put out for a short time by a hard body jolt.



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### N. H. A. DOES NOT WANT AGREEMENT FOR TWO YEARS

Maritime Association's Offer Not Viewed With Favor—Four-Year Term is Preferred

The chief clauses in the new agreement between the Maritime Provinces Hockey League and the National Hockey Association have been wired by the Maritime body to President Emmett Quinn. It is like that some time will elapse before the agreement is approved by the N.H.A., as they are not willing to accept some of the clauses.

With the dissolution of the old M.P.H.A. the original understanding between the two leagues, which had till January 15th to run, was abrogated and President Emmett Quinn forwarded the Eastern men a new agreement. This was not accepted, but they drew up another document, the substance of which was wired to the local officials Wednesday.

The main cause of the delay in the clause stipulating that the agreement is only for two years, whereas the local officials want a four-year agreement. President Quinn has written the Eastern officials and hopes that the matter will be speedily straightened out.

### PITRE SAYS HE IS GOING TO PLAY HARD

Didier Pitre, the former Canadian, traded by George Kennedy to the Patricks in exchange for Newsy Lalonde, is out on the coast now.

"There was no truth in the report that I did not want to come to the coast," Pitre told a Vancouver paper. "That's just what I wanted to do, and I am going to play some real hockey out here, too. It will only take me a couple of days to get into shape, for I have taken the best of care of myself all summer and fall and I think this is going to be my best season. I hope so, anyway."
