Some large ones brought 20 cents per pound. Beef seemed to be very plentiful and brought from 7 to 10 cents per pound for the quarter Pork sold by the carcass for 11 cents Higgs sold at 40 rents and butter at 35 cents. Potatoes were plentiful a \$1.25 per barrel.
