DENIES THAT HE
PUT BULLET THROUGH
POLICEMAN'S HELMET

Bennie LaBlanc, Escaped Lunatic, Identified by Chief Rideout of Moncton Police, at Burton Jail--- Will Return to Hospital

Chief George Rideout of the Moncton police, arrived here Saturday and went to Burton jail where he identified as Bennie LaBlanc of Moncton the young man captured at Fredericton Junction last week for robbing the post-office and the stores of T. B. Hartt and S. D. Alexander. LeBlanc admitted his connection with the robbery and said that the story that he had had accomplices was a bluff.

Chief Rideout questioned LeBlanc with regard to the matter of putting a bullet through a policeman's helmet at Moncton some time ago. LeBlanc denied that he had done so, giving a pretty straight story in regard to the matter.

LeBlanc has served sentences in Dorchester and Kingston penitentiaries, being sent to Kingston from the other institution, from Kingston he was sent to the Provincial Hospital at Fairville. He escaped from that institution some weeks ago and has been in Moncton since. It was since his escape that he is said to have had trouble with the Moncton police. LeBlanc shows few signs of insanity.

The prisoner, on the order of the attorney general, is to be returned to the Provincial Hospital. On Thursday he will be taken to Fredericton Junction and handed over to guards from the hospital, who will take him to Fairville.

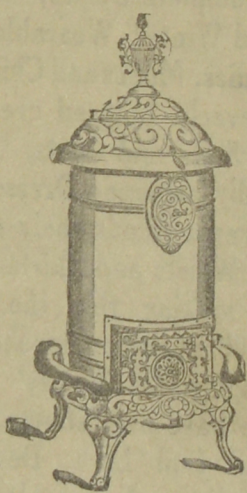
