TINKER SAYS HE WANTS TO STAY WITH CHICAGO CUBS

Does Not Believe His Sale to Brooklyn
Was Unconditional--Talks of
Bigger Money

Chicago, Dec. 13.—"I do not want to play ball with Brooklyn," was the comment today of Joe Tinker on his sale by the Cincinnati Nationals to the Brooklyn club. The former manager of the Reds had no other statement to make, but he has not given up hope of returning to the Chicago Nationals. He believes that his sale was conditional, and that by remaining non-committal, he may force President Herrmann of the Reds to reconsider the deal.

Tinker has told friends he would not consider the offer of \$75,000 a year and a \$10,000 bonus to sign unless the contract is for three years. He has said he would not consider a contract for one year unless the salary was \$10,000 and even then might refuse. Tinker has said he will not do anything unless he is convinced he has no chance of playing again with the Cubs.

C. W. Murphy, owner of the Cubs, when he was in New York, requested Herrmann for permission to talk to Tinker and asked the Cincinnati president to make a list of players he wanted in exchange for his former manager.

"Herrmann wrote Archer and I stopped him right there," Murphy said.

Murphy was surprised when he learned, en route to Chicago, that Tinker was sold, but does not wish to violate major league ethics and make an offer for his former star.

JAMES K. NEWBRO FOR DELOIMER PARK MEET

Montreal, Dec. 13.—Seventy entries are shown in the official list made public by the management of the Montreal Driving Club, for their annual winter harness meeting to be held at Delorimer Park next month. The nominations come from almost all over Canada, while a great many harness centres of the United States are also represented. Entries have been received from as far west as Winnipeg and Calgary and in the east from as far West as Winnipeg and Calgary and in the east from Fredericton, N. B. The middle states will be well represented by well known campaigners.

Five stakes will be run during the meeting, the fields being all well balanced, which is shown by the fact that there is not a single sentry standing out over the field as is often the case in harness racing. The stakes all have a value of \$1,000 and should attract a good lot of starters out of the original nomination. From the stake entries the class races should fill well and offer keen competition each afternoon during the meeting. Three or more races will be run each day.

JOE DONNELLY RETIRES FROM SPORT AT OLD MCGILL

Threatened Investigation of His Past
Record Causes Him to Take
That Action

Montreal, Dec. 12.—Presumably as a result of the cloud under which his amateur status rests because of assertions made in Eastern newspapers that he had played professional base ball in the Maritime Provinces, Joe Donnelly, the big McGill line-plunger announced today that he would not take any further part in sport. Donnelly had been expected to figure as McGill's best wrestler in the Inter-collegiate mat tournament this winter, and is also a clever basketball who will be greatly missed from the Red and White five. Donnelly did not definitely state that the intimations launched against him were the cause of his retirement from sport, but his announcement is generally interpreted in that way.

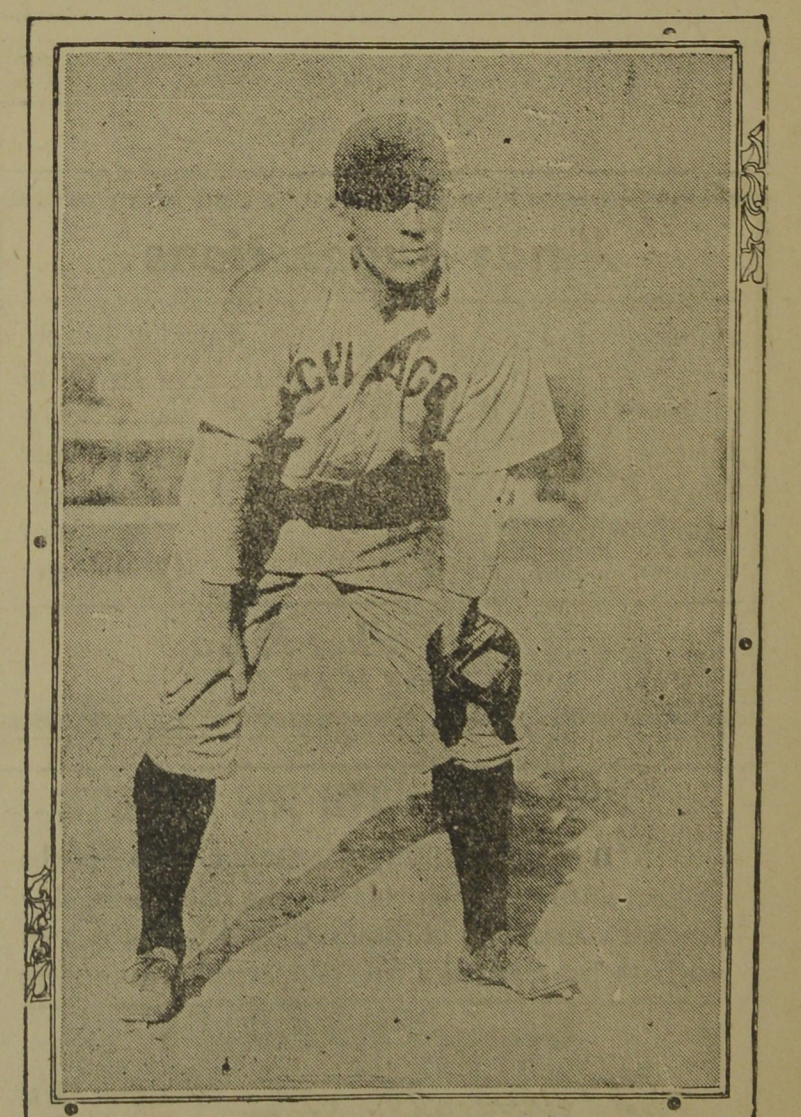
Should the investigation now under way by the McGill authorities clear Donnelly's amateur character, it is likely that he can be induced to return to winter activities, but the investigation is making very slow headway. The committee announced today that no answers had been received, from the men in the Maritime Provinces to whom inquiries into the big line-plunger's amateur status been sent. The officials are somewhat surprised over the time it has taken to get any evidence from the East, but attribute the delay to the time taken in looking up past records.

SENATORS REFUSE TO PLAY NEW GLASGOW

Ottawa, Dec. 12.—It now appears likely that both Skene Roman and Jack Darragh will sign with the Ottawas at the price offered them, \$1,000. The players evidently realize that they are up against it this year. Roman announced that he would confer with the club today, and that Darragh would probably be content to sign at the same terms. Ottawas have signed both Mike Murphy and Allen Wilson, of the New Glasgow club. While they purchased Wilson for \$250 from NeR Glasgow, the local club will refuse to pay the money, claiming that NeR Glasgow, having dropped out of the Maritime League has no right to any of the players who were with them at the time.
