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## POOR TORY MEMORIES

Conservative papers are still declaring that the Liberal government did nothing to reduce tariff taxation during its fifteen years of office. They must have forgotten that speech made by Sir Charles Tupper, in 1897, when the first Fielding tariff was introduced and he almost wept in parliament imagining "the wail, the pitiful wail" of the Canadian manufacturers and saw the ruin of their industries with the reduced tariff. They must have forgotten the British preference which cut duties by 33 1/2 per cent. and met with so much veiled opposition from the Tories, who put "the interests" ahead of their imperialism. They must have forgotten the subsequent Fielding tariffs, which readjusted and reduced the tariffs in spite of violent Tory opposition. They must have forgotten that the Liberal government lost office owing to a conspiracy by the high tariff Conservatives with the Anti-Imperial Nationalists, financed by "the interests," whose profits were swollen by high protection, in order to prevent the government from reducing the cost of living in Canada by cutting off the duties on the necessities of life.

The Liberal party represents a progressive movement towards tariff reduction for the benefit of the taxpayers. The Borden government is so at the mercy of "the interests" that it must stand pat for high tariff. The time is not far distant when the people will be able to relieve themselves of the burden of Bordenism.

If this brisk trade in potatoes between this section of the country and the United States keeps up the time will come before long when mammoth potato warehouses will be needed in this city. With the American market available to the farmers of York County it is a pretty safe prediction that before another three years rolls around this county will raise three times as many potatoes as were produced this year.

It looks as if the little scheme hatched by Premier Fleming to get rid of his colleague Col. McLeod, by the Ottawa route has been knocked in the head. Hon. J. D. Hazen, whose co-operation in carrying out the scheme was enlisted by the Premier, has been told by men high in the councils of the party that Col. McLeod cannot be elected in York.

Premier Hazen and Hon. Bob Rogers, the bad man of the Borden government are coming to the province next week. If they do not include this city in their itinerary "a delegation of Tories representing the Pinder and McLeod wings of the party will surely journey to John to see them.

Mr. O. S. Crockett, M.P., and Mr. J. K. Pinder, M.P.P., hiked off to Ottawa last week to interview the government. The old gentleman has no intention of allowing the McLeod-Mullin faction to eulchre him out of the Tory nomination for the Ottawa seat and he seems to have Mr. Crockett behind him.

A wing of the Fleming cabinet seems to be under the impression that somebody walked off with a big chunk of the boodle fund at the last local election. If the money was invested in western lands as alleged, it has not thus far been a profitable investment.

If Hon. Mr. Hazen and Hon. Bob Rogers during their visit to the province next week, can only persuade Attorney General Grimmer to proclaim the act creating an additional judgeship, York's seat in the federal parliament would soon be vacant.

IMPORTANT CHANGES  
IN BISLEY RULES

London, Nov. 9.—Colonel Crosse of the National Rifle Association states that Colonel Ward of the War Office has accepted the membership of the Council of the National Rifle Association. In view of the persistent rumors of friction existing between the War Office and the National Rifle Association, which was likely to affect the future of the Bisley meets, the announcement will be particularly pleasing to Bisley votaries in Canada.

Colonel Crosse also announced that the next Bisley meeting has been fixed to open on July 13, and that the following new regulations as to sighting shots have been made:

(1) That before the individual competitions in which each shot is separately signalled, and which is not shot for shoulder to shoulder, one compulsory nonconvertible sighting shot will be taken.

(2) There is to be no sighting shot before "A" competitions in which each shot is not separately signalled, "B" team competitions, "C" before tie shooting, and "D" before shoulder to shoulder shooting.

(3) In match rifle competitions the target will have a central 24 inches in diameter to be marked with V, which count 64 in service rifle competitions; bullseye at 500 yards will be reduced from 18 inches diameter to 16 inches.

The Council have decided to send a British rifle team to Australia next year, and have appointed Colonel Barlow commander, and Mr. J. P. Somers shooting captain.

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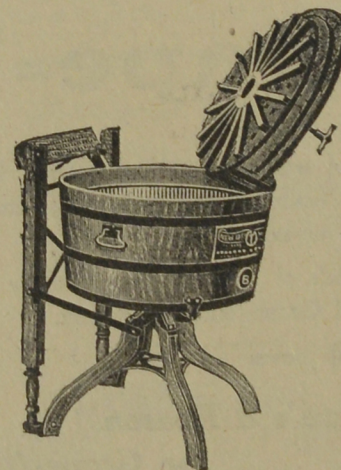
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
