DIED THIS MORNING.

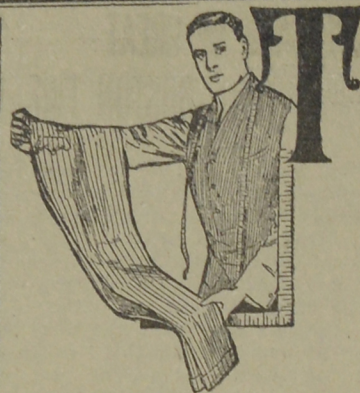

RAILWAY PEOPLE
TO EXPROPRIATE
STREET TO SHEDS

Enough Land to be Taken From Lynch Property to Give Access to Aberdeen Street Extension

It is announced that the Intercolonial Railway has begun expropriation proceedings in regard to land for a street to connect with the new freight-shed now being erected on land secured from the Timothy Lynch property with the extension of Aberdeen street to be made by the city. Papers have been served and it is expected that arrangements for the transfer of the land will be made at an early date. The land required is understood to be sixty-six feet in width, the regulation width of a city street.

Ald. Mitchell, chairman of the Road Committee of the City Council, stated this morning that the extension of Aberdeen street from York street to the line of Carleton street, had been decided upon and would be made probably this fall. He said nothing had been decided with regard to the extension of Carleton street from Needham street extension. To make this extension houses must be removed.

The Aberdeen street extension will be part upon the Torrens property and part upon city property. It is thought that the further extension of Aberdeen street to Regent street, through the Lynch property, will be only a matter of time.

GEORGE A. CLIFF
DIED SUDDENLY
IN CALIFORNIA

Former Resident of Fredericton Passed Away After Four Hours Illness-- Had Lived in San Diego Twelve Years

George A. Cliff, for many years a resident of this city, died yesterday at San Diego, California, after a brief illness. The deceased was a son of the late Nelson A. Cliff of Queensbury and was in the eightieth year of his age. A widow, a sister of Dr. A.B. Atherton of this city, survives, also three brothers, Nelson A. Cliff of Florida, Dr. L. A. Cliff of Boston, and James S. Cliff of Queensbury, and one sister, Mrs. Price of St. John. Four sons also survive, one in British Columbia, one in San Francisco, one in San Diego and one elsewhere in California.

The late Mr. Cliff, according to a telegram from San Diego, was ill but six hours. Word was sent to his brother-in-law, Dr. Atherton, but the latter was not in the city, having left last week for Chicago to attend a congress of surgeons.

The deceased in his early life, was prominently connected with the lumbering business in this province. In his latter life he resided in Fredericton leaving the city some twelve years ago to take up his residence in California.

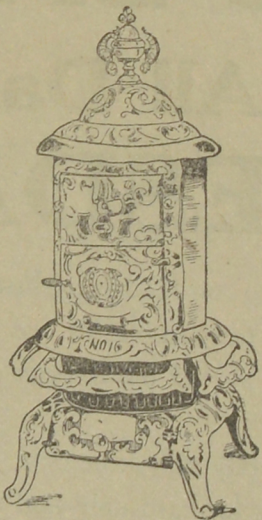

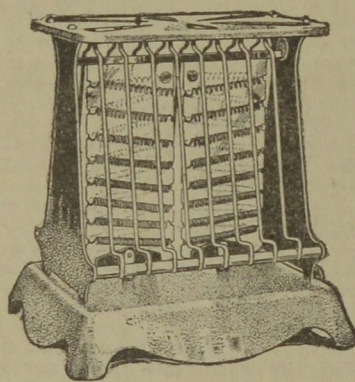
