day morning and continued the early  
part of Sunday stopped later in the  
day and the finest of autumn weather  
is now promised for the exhibition  
and the races.

The opening events of the meet  
were run off this afternoon, the 2:30  
pace and 2:27 trot and the 2:15 pace  
and 2:18 trot furnishing good sport.  
Tomorrow the two-year-old trot, the  
three-year-old trot and the 2:14 pace  
and 2:11 trot will be run off.

The track is in first-class condition  
and fast time is expected. With big  
fields in all classes and close contests  
expected in all, the track-followers  
will see some lively heats. P. H. Mc-  
Namara of Bangor, Me., will be the  
starter for the meet.

The balance of the horses entered  
for the meet arrived here Saturday  
and are at the track in quarters.  
Boutillier's stable has not arrived and

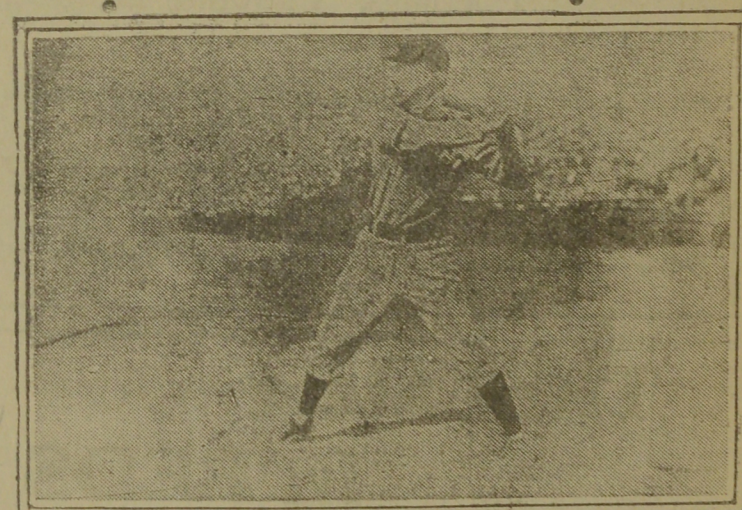
