**A NEW BRANCH**

**BANNS PUBLISHED**

At St. Anthony's church, St. Marys yesterday there were published the banns of marriage of Miss Annie Hooper late of Edinburgh, Scotland, and Mr. James Malone of Stanley.

**MILL DESTROYED**

A saw mill at Three Brooks, Victoria County owned by Mr. J. D. McLaughlin, was totally destroyed by fire on Saturday. The loss is between \$9000 and \$10,000, and there was about \$3,400 insurance.

**SPECIAL POLICE**

Thirty special police are on duty at the exhibition grounds and eight at the race-track. City Marshal Roberts is in charge. He has performed this duty at exhibitions for a quarter of a century.

**CONSUMPTION OF WATER.**

**PARTINGTON CO.  
TO REBUILD DAM  
AT MARYSVILLE**

Fishway Will be Installed by Company  
---Lumber-Cut on Nashwaak will  
Be Much Curtailed Next  
Winter

The Partington Pulp & Paper Company is taking steps to rebuild the dam at Marysville which was carried out by the freshet last spring. The operations of rebuilding will be under taken as soon as a competent foreman can be secured. The dam is to be rebuilt on the old site and a ledge of rock makes the work difficult. Mr. E. B. Staples, manager at Marysville for the Partington Co., stated this morning to The Mail that the rebuilding of the dam was necessary for the driving of the lumber in the Nashwaak River and that it did not necessarily mean that the sawmill at Marysville would be operated. Mr. Staples stated further that nothing was known about the future operation of that mill.

Last winter the Partington Company cut 12,000,000 feet of lumber on the Nashwaak and 4,000,800 feet on the Bartholemew, 16,000,000 feet in all. The cut will be greatly curtailed next winter, particularly on the Nashwaak. This curtailment will be made because a considerable quantity of the lumber in 1913 was hung up.

**WILL INSTAL FISHWAY.**

In connection with the rebuilding of the dam at Marysville the Partington Company will instal a fishway in compliance with the regulations of the Fishery Department. The fishway will permit salmon to reach the upper waters of the Nashwaak.

**MINISTER CONDEMNNS  
NON-OBSERVANCE  
OF THE SABBATH**

Rev. Dr. W. H. Smith Stated That Public Bodies Seemed to Have No Regard for Sabbath--In-cident at Fair Grounds

Rev. Dr. W. H. Smith, minister of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, in the course of a sermon upon Sabbath Observance last night, expressed the opinion that unnecessary work as being done on the Sabbath at the exhibition grounds. He regretted greatly that such a state of affairs was permitted to exist, particularly as there was a law forbidding such breaking of the Sabbath.

The preacher stated further that there was a marked tendency toward non-observance of the Sabbath. There had been a time when the people of New Brunswick could view with regret the lax observance of the Lord's Day, which prevailed in the Western States, in Continental Europe and elsewhere but at the present time things were done in this province on Sunday which two years ago would have provoked an outburst of public disapproval. Rev. Dr. Smith also said that in the matter of Sabbath non-observance public bodies and corporations seemed to be able to act in a manner in which it would be impossible for individuals to act.

**INCIDENT AT GROUNDS.**

An incident at the exhibition grounds Sunday afternoon in which Rev. Dr. W. H. Smith and Rev. J. E. Wilson were concerned has excited much public comment. These clergymen entered the grounds but were

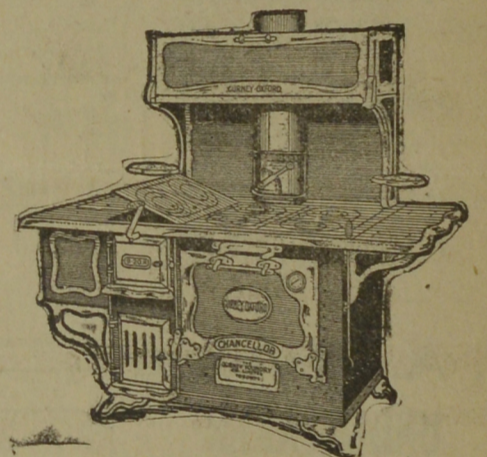
