The market this morning was not quite as large as usual but fairly good prices prevailed. Chief McCollum and several of his men were on hand and kept a sharp watch out for forestallers. Thanksgiving poultry was in brisk demand and brought good prices. Geese sold at \$1.00 and \$1.25 each, ducks at \$1.25 per pair, chickens from 80 cents to \$1.25 and turkeys at 25 cents per pound. Other prices were as follows:—Potatoes per barrel, \$1.00; turnips 50 cents, apples per barrel, \$2; lamb per quarter, \$1 to \$1.25, pork per lb., 11 cents; butter per lb., 22 cents; eggs per dozen, 30 cents; cabbages each, 5 cents; cauliflowers, 10 cents, carrots per half barrel, 75 cents.

J. FRED RYAN  
TO BUILD NEW  
FIRE STATION

Local Contractor Lowest of Four Tenderers—Price is \$19,975—Work Will Begin as Soon as Possible

J. Fred Ryan of this city, was awarded the contract for the construction of the new central fire-station yesterday afternoon. This was the lowest of four tenders, the price being \$19,475. Mr. Ryan also has the contract for the foundation of the building and has almost completed it this week's rain having delayed the work to some extent. The new contract will be executed on Monday and the work of construction will begin as soon as possible.

Four tenders were before the Fire Committee at yesterday's meeting. The other tenderers were R. A. Corbett of St. John, C. W. Burnett of Fredericton, and Charles A. Hall of Fredericton.

The new fire-station is to be of brick with front of grey tapestry brick, with facings of dressed freestone. The front will be three stories in height and the rear two stories in height. Living quarters for the permanent men of the fire department are to be included in the new building, making the cost some thousands of dollars more than was the cost of the station which it was proposed before to erect.

CONFERENCE ON  
EDUCATION AT  
HALIFAX, OCT 22

Chief Supt. Carter and Dr. H. S. Bridges will Represent New Brunswick ---To Arrange Maritime Convention for 1914

Dr. W. S. Carter, Chief Superintendent of Education, and Dr. H. S. Bridges of St. John, Superintendent of the Schools in that city, are to represent New Brunswick at an educational conference to be held in Halifax on Wednesday next. Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island are also to be represented. Dr. Carter will leave for Halifax on Tuesday.

The main object of the conference will be to arrange for a Maritime Provinces' Teachers' Institute for 1914. The three provinces have their own gathering corresponding to institutes but one representation of the Maritime Provinces is desired. A Dominion Educational Convention was held in Halifax recently and proved so successful that it was decided to attempt to organize something similar for the Lower Provinces.

Dr. Carter, while in Halifax, will officially visit the Halifax School for the Blind and also the School for the Deaf.

The conference, besides being held for the purpose named, will also serve to bring out discussion on agricultural education and other kindred matters.

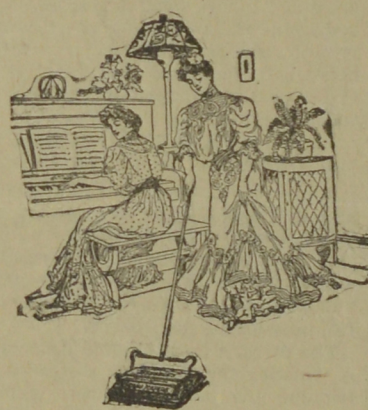
