The U.N.B. Rugby team will leave for Wolfville this evening, where it will play Acadia on Thursday in the second game of the Intercollegiate League. This game will be the last and deciding one as far as U.N.B. is concerned, the Red and Black having beaten Mount A. The team was chosen last night, five substitutes being selected to accompany the regulars. The team is as follows:

There are prospects that both sub forwards will be played as Jewett has a leg that has put him out of games before this season and "Rick" Murray has a sore side. Griffiths is to replace Jewett and Barker Murray. If Bender is knocked out McFadden will take his place and Dougherty will perform McFadden's duties.

WANDERERS WON FROM DAL ON THEIR MERITS

Winners' Halves and Quarters Completely Out-classed
Dalhousie---College Team Fought Loosing
Battle From First---Dwyer Formerly of St. F. X.
Scored Dal's Solitary Try

(Halifax Chronicle.)

By all odds the best Rugby game of this season in Halifax was staged at the Wanderers grounds on Saturday, when about a thousand followers of the game (the chilly weather prevented larger attendance) saw the Wanderers inflict the decisive defeat of 11 to 5 upon the Dalhousie team, thereby placing themselves on even terms with the University in the race for the championship of the Halifax Rugby League. Both teams have won two victories to their credit and next Saturday will see the fifth and deciding game. Had the Wanderers lost on Saturday the championship would have been Dalhousie's.

Good, fast, clean football prevailed throughout the game. The air was very chilly and the players, eager as they were to win, put more life into their play than has been the custom of late years. Dalhousie fought it out to the last and on the defensive during the greater part of the last half, did not give up hope until the whistle sounded for time. The score at the end of the first half stood 8-5 in favor of the Wanderers.

WANDERERS SCORED FIRST.

The Wanderers gained the first points, Phillips scoring a splendid penalty goal from a distance of about forty yards and at a very difficult angle. The kick was awarded by the referee because of a crooked throw into the scrum by a Dalhousie quarter. Within the next three minutes Dwyer of the College, crossed the Wanderers' goal line and Marsters easily converted. Before half time arrived Fapsain Hart, from a pass by Ross, fell over the University line and placed his team once more in the lead. Phillips converted with another beautiful kick. The only score in the second half was made by Gorman after a brilliant run by the Wanderers' halves and quarters in which Medcalf played the most prominent part.

The Wanderers won the game purely on merit. They were determined to win and there was not one man of the fifteen who on Saturday did not play the game to the best of his ability.

TEAM IMPROVED.

Their team was a tremendous improvement on that of the Saturday previous when the Collegians had such an easy win. The half line was the strongest section. The quartette consisted of Gorman, Medcalf, Ross and Usher and their combination was a revelation. Medcalf was the star. His speed on Saturday was very much in evidence and he used his head to great advantage. On one occasion he ran from his own 35-yard line to within ten yards of the Dalhousie goal and it was from this run that the Wanderers' final score resulted. Ross, who played his first game of the season, seemed in excellent condition and showed much of his old time speed. He figured in every play of prominence and participated in the scoring of the first try. Gorman was in splendid condition and was especially effective in defense work. Usher, whose knee has been in poor shape of late, used his punting ability to advantage. The Wanderers' quarters ran the halves a close second. They were the old trio of Borne, Bauld and Gillis, but their positions were so exchanged as to make their former style of play a joke by contrast. On Saturday Bauld played at flying quarter and whenever he received the ball it was passed to the halves in record time, resulting in repeated attacks by the halves on the Dalhousie defense. At interference Borne was very useful, while Gillis in his original position played his usual clean, heady game. At full back, Phillips was in his element. His penalty kicking was one of the special features of the game. In defense work he was his usual self.

The Wanderers' forward line allowed a shade to their opponents in handling, but their greater weight enabled them to gain ground in the scrum.

work. Their dribbling was good. Hart Desbriay Blois were always after the ball.

THE DALHOUSIE TEAM

Of the losers' vanguard, Pineo Phinney and Marsters put up the most aggressive game.

In the College back division on Saturday there were some changes from the former team. Both Grahams, "Crummie" at half, and D. R. at quarter, were unable to play on account of injuries, and substitutes had to be found. Dwyer, an ex-St. F. X. man, played on the half line and was prominent throughout. He scored Dalhousie's only try, on fifteen yard run, in which he eluded three Wanderers with comparative ease. He has considerable speed and showed a fine knowledge of the game. Ross, who played interference quarter, was energetic, but showed lack of experience in his position. The college half line played well together and their passing was nicely planned, but they were as a rule too close marked to make much impression on the Wanderers' defence. Richmond on one occasion was clear away, having kicked over Phillips' head, but that player obstructed the College half in his attempt to regain the ball, and a possible try was thus prevented. Johnson and Meech played their usual snappy game. Campbell, at full back, punted as ably as of yore.

Acadia picked up another big score against King's on Saturday. There should be some game at Wolfville Thursday when U.N.B. and Acadia meet.

SIDERSKI'S OPINION.

The Acadian Recorder of Halifax, commenting on the U.N.B.---Mount A. game, says:
"L. Siderski of Sydney, the former back of Dalhousie, who refereed the game, was in town today, returning from Fredericton. He says it was a clean, well played game. Mr. Siderski refereed a game between these colleges five years ago and he says the present teams are playing better football than those of that time, the great improvement being almost surprising."

ALL BLACKS SHOW CALIFORNIA TEAMS CLASSY RUGBY

New Zealanders Have Dribbling and
Punting Down Fine---Punt
With Either Foot

Local Rugby footballers may learn something to their advantage and followers of the game will be much interested in the following from the San Francisco Post in commenting on the New Zealand All-Blacks:

The Stanford and California have a lot to learn is shown in the All-Blacks' game. At every angle, save tackling, their work is beyond comparison with that of the universities. Their forward work has been a revelation to local Rugby fans. The Waratahs, who visited here from Australia last year, were considered great dribblers and wonders when it came to getting off their passes and following up the ball, but the Waratahs can hardly be compared with this team.

It is little short of remarkable the way the All-Blacks handle and follow the ball. They seem to anticipate just the bound the ball will make and invariably grab it on the dead run. Their dribbling work, though is what will net them more scores probably than the passing rushes. Unlike most of the local Rugby teams the forwards of the All Blacks follow the ball closely. In dribbling, they keep the ball right at their feet and carry it along with them instead of booting it twenty or thirty feet and then catching up with it as the teams in this vicinity do.

A noticeable feature of the back-field division of the visitors in their ability to kick. They have developed the boot with either foot and kick as well with the left as the right foot. Not only is their kicking long, but it is accurate, and further than that they seem able to kick from any position.

These fine points of the game are what the universities have to learn before they can cope successfully with (Continued on page three.)

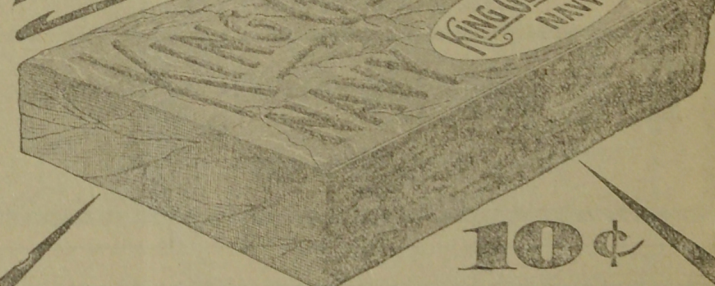
