Hertert McKay of Boiestown, passed away at the Victoria Hospital this morning after an operation for appendicitis. The deceased was twenty-three years of age. The remains will be taken to Boiestown.

## AT MAYOR'S DISCRETION.

The matter of enforcing the bylaw forbidding signs or advertising devices overhanging the sidewalk is to be left at the discretion of His Worship Mayor Hooper. The mayor will enforce the bylaw but its enforcement is to be gradual. Signs to come under the head of electric signs must have their advertising matter shown by electric light. Ordinary signs with electric bulbs on them are not to be classed as electric signs.

## PASTOR REMEMBERED.

Rev. H. H. Ferguson, pastor of the Gibson United Baptist Church, and Mrs. Ferguson were kindly remembered by a number of their friends last evening. The company, which numbered about seventy, assembled at their home and through Mr. H. P. Lint presented them with a Linoges china dinner and tea set, an easy chair, an oak rocker and a chest. Rev. Mr. Ferguson returned thanks on behalf of his wife and himself. After presentation a dainty luncheon was served.

## ANOTHER CONFERENCE.

The Administration of Justice Committee of the City Council has been empowered to confer with a committee from the Municipal Council on the subject of reapportioning the cost of administering justice between city and county. The city now pays one-third of the total. The county authorities desire the city to bear one-half the cost of maintenance of Court House and jail, also that the cost of criminal cases and of coroner's inquests be paid by city or county according to their place of origin. The city's counter proposition has been that the city is made a separate municipality. What the outcome of the next conference will be is problematical. It will be held December 2.

CHRISTMAS SHIP  
SAILS TOMORROW

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 4.—The last transport that will reach the Island of Guam and the Philippines before Christmas will sail from this port tomorrow and Col. John T. Knight, the local depot quartermaster of the U. S. army and his assistants are almost overwhelmed with work owing to the enormous number of Christmas gifts for the American soldiers in the far East which have accumulated here during the past week or so. Two years ago the Christmas transport did not stop at Guam and it was necessary to postpone the Christmas festivities on the island for one month. This was due to an epidemic of smallpox on account of which the transport was not allowed to land its cargo of gifts.

## SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION OPENED THIS MORNING

Many Delegates Here for Annual Gathering of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Sunday School Convention

The thirtieth annual convention for the Province of New Brunswick of the N.B. and P.E.I. Sunday School Association opened this morning at the Brunswick Street Baptist Church and will continue tomorrow and on Thursday. A large number of delegates are here to attend the convention, many arriving last night and others arriving today. All parts of the two provinces are well represented.

This morning at 10.30 a conference began with Rev. Franklin McElfresh, Ph.D., International Teacher Training Superintendent, in the chair. This conference was well attended and Rev. Mr. McElfresh's address upon "Graded Lessons" proved very interesting.

## AFTERNOON SESSION.

This afternoon several very interesting addresses took place. Dr. McElfresh discussed "The Debt of the Sunday School to the New Study of Child Nature." The report of the Elementary Division Superintendent was read by Mrs. W. A. Ross. Mrs. Havelock Coy and Mrs. Ross discussed teaching methods in the elementary division and Miss Alice Story discussed "Our Primary Department." There also was an address by Rev. Dr. W. H. Smith.

Tonight at eight o'clock the president, Rev. J. C. B. Appel, will deliver his address and Rev. Neil McLaughlan will welcome the visiting delegates. Mr. Andrew Malcolm of St. John, will respond.

## CITY HANDED LEMON BY DOMINION GOVERNMENT

Bill for Current for Electric Lamps About Soldiers' Barracks Paid by City—Effort to Make Better Terms

The current for the six clusters of electric lamps upon the iron fence surrounding the Soldiers' Barracks is being paid for by the city. This fact was discovered by the City Council in committee last night when the Street Lighting Committee presented a bill for \$10.56 from the Fredericton Gaslight Company for supplying current for these lamps from the opening of the exhibition, September 15, until the end of that month. The bill for October has not yet been presented.

The aldermen were very much surprised to learn that the supposed gift of the Dominion government really added to the financial burden of the city. At the rate charged the lights will cost about \$300 a year to maintain.

Ald. Rogers, chairman of the Street Lighting Committee, when called upon for an explanation, said that as soon as he had received the bill he had waited upon Mr. O. S. Crockett M.P., by whom he had been told that it was not the custom for the government to maintain such lights in other places and it could not be done in Fredericton. Ald. Rogers said he had approached Ex-Mayor Thomas and had been told that there had been an understanding between the government and the old

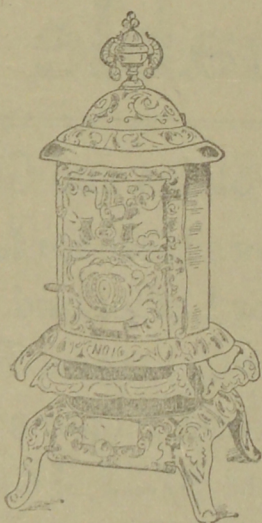

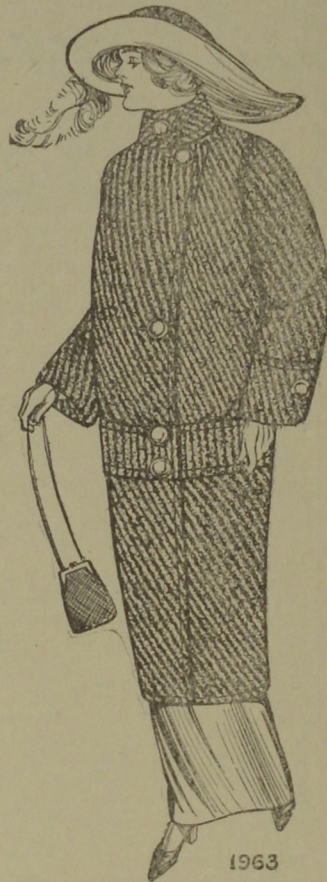

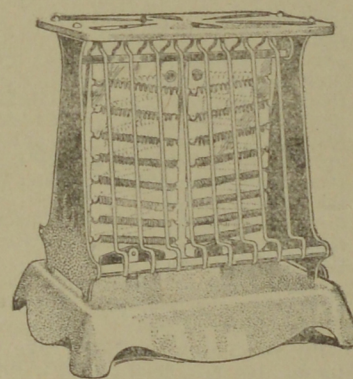
