## COST OF LIVING MOUNTS

The cost of living still tends upward. Statistics published by the labor department this week shows that during August there was another increase in the average cost of articles of general household consumption. The increase as compared with August of last year is about three per cent. Meanwhile the high tariff friends of the government are appealing for tariff revision upwards especially in regard to wool and iron and steel commodities that vitally affect the cost of living. Meanwhile there is no suggestion from any government source of any decrease in tariff taxation or of any fiscal relief to the general consumer. Meanwhile federal expenditures which will have to be met for the most part out of customs taxation, continue to mount. Meanwhile there is no sign of following the example of the United States in regard to reducing the duties on foodstuffs.

Premier Borden seems to think that the problem of freer trade in food products has been solved by the action of the Democratic Congress in giving Canada freer access to the American markets. That was only half of the problem. The Canadian consumers' half of the problem still is to be met. The government will not solve it by running away from it.

Moose Jaw Times:—Your true blue Tory has a great contempt for the working man, who makes up seventy-five per cent. of the population of our great cities. He believes him to be an ignorant dullard who will accept any old story told him by a man who will wave the flag, denounce the other side as traitors, and perhaps hand out a few cheap election cigars and a little intoxicating liquor. The Tory filibuster in politics has so often proved this theory correct, and so often gotten away with it, that he has come to have a wholesome contempt for what he is pleased to call the "mob" in private.

The coroner's jury, in the case of Benjamin Phillips of Harvey shot by a companion in mistake for a moose, returned a verdict to the effect that the shooting was accidental. They expressed the belief that if Phillips had remained in the position his companion thought he had taken the accident would have been averted. The jury might have gone a little further and stated positively that the other man had remained at home, he would not have shot Phillips in mistake for a moose.

East Elgin Reformer:—In 1911 Canada was offered exclusive rights in the United States markets for her farm products, now she has to meet the producers from other lands in the American market. The city and town artisan was offered cheaper food on many lines; now he will be forced to pay the increase without any compensating advantage. The outlook for sane tariff arrangement has not been brighter in Canada for half a century. Economic truth will out.

If all the electors of this County who are constantly declaring that they have cast their last Tory vote mean what they say, it is not surprising that our M. P. is anxious to get out of political life by the judgeship route.

## CARSON REVIEWS HIS "ARMY."

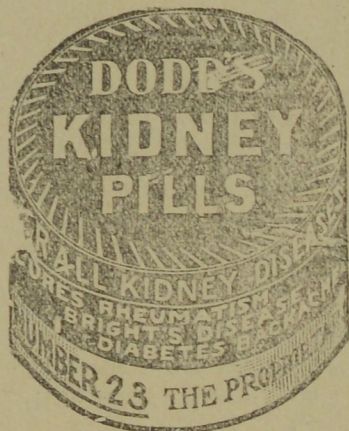
Belfast (Sept. 27)—The review today of 11,000 Belfast volunteers belonging to the army of Ulster, by Sir Edward Carson, attracted thousands of people from the surrounding districts and from every part of the province of Ulster. Besides the four Belfast regiments, each of them commanded by a retired army or militia officer, the "Ulster war staff," consisting of General Richardson, two retired colonels and two retired captains, paraded.

The volunteers were armed with dummy rifles, as the carrying of arms by unlicensed persons is prohibited in the British Isles.

## REDMOND'S OFFER TO CARSON.

London, Sept. 28—Mr. Redmond has made an offer to Sir Edward Carson to discuss with him every provision of the home rule act, to meet the needs and desires of Ulster if the Ulster leader would concede the principle of a local parliament for Ireland.

Answering this offer, Sir Edward Carson has telegraphed to The Daily Express, announcing his willingness to discuss any measure for the improvement of the existing government of Ireland, provided she retains her position under the imperial parliament.

## CAUSE FOR COMPLAINT.

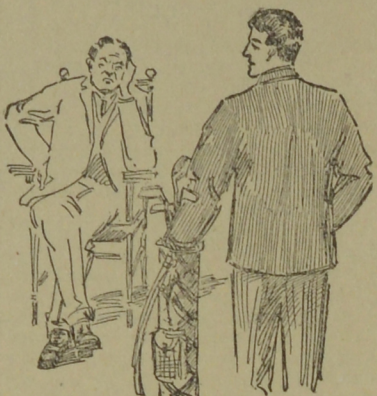

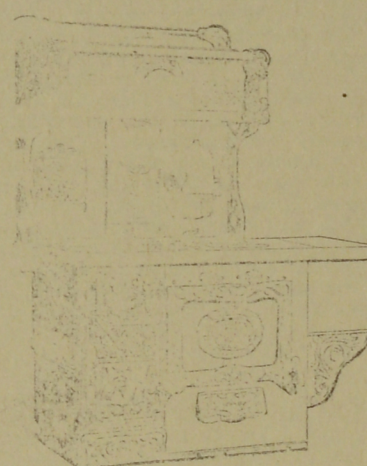
