## NO CHANGE REPORTED.

No change is reported with regard to the position of Medical Officer at No. 3 Station, R.C.R., in this city. Major S. F. A. Belton, Permanent Army Medical Corps, who was transferred here from London, Ont., several weeks ago, is still in the city so that one small infantry depot, under strength, has two medical officers, only one of whom is performing duties. Major Wainwright has no intention of relinquishing the position and Lt.-Col. Belton, who left London to make room for a political appointment, as officer of the Permanent Corps, must be provided for. The situation is interesting for the Militia Department.

see only for a long time to come promises of higher living bills.

Cattle now pay duties on entering the States of from \$2 to \$3.75 a head up to 27½ per cent. of their value and in spite of that heavy tax the Canadians sold to the United States last year almost a million dollars' worth. The duty on hay is reduced from \$4 to \$2 a ton, and last year Canada, in spite of that \$4 a ton duty, sold to the Americans \$5,187,727 worth. The American hay buyers are here in full force and although there was a poor crop this year, they are expected to pay close to \$10,000,000 for Canadian hay this fall and next winter.

The Canadian newspapers have been keeping pretty mum on the whole subject but some of them are beginning to whoop it up a little, now that it is all over but the shouting at Washington. The Nova Scotia coal companies, which sold nearly two and three-quarter million dollars worth of soft coal, dutiable at 45 cents a ton, will unquestionably increase their output and their exports to the New England States.

Crayton were shot and killed. Walter then went to the home of his mother and aroused his 18-year-old brother. Together, they proceeded through the main street of the little town firing at everyone in sight.

Citizens aroused from their slumber by the shots fired out of the windows and then hastened to cover, believing that riots of more serious proportions had broken out.

The two boys went to the home of Former Constable Frank Keinstly, and when he responded to their call to come out he was shot through the head by Walter Jones. Keinstly's son, William, saw his father fall and reached for a gun, but before he could fire he received a bullet in one of his hands.

## VERDICT OF NOT GUILTY.

At St. John today the jury in the case of Viola Reid, charged with the murder of her infant child, after two hours deliberation, returned a verdict of not guilty.

## NOTHING TO THAT SURPLUS OF \$6000

Secretary W. S. Hooper of the Fredericton Exhibition, has informed The Mail that there is no basis for the statement which has been quite widely published that the Fredericton Exhibition of 1913, which closed on the 20th inst., has a surplus of \$6000.

"I know of no person," said Secretary Hooper, "who is in a position to make any estimate of the finances of the exhibition. Matters are far from being settled, in fact, never are for some weeks after any exhibition. If directors are said to be the source of the information I don't know who they are or how they would know what the surplus would be. The exhibition may have the surplus named and it may not. There is absolutely no way of telling at the present time. The stories published are the product of an overly strong imagination."

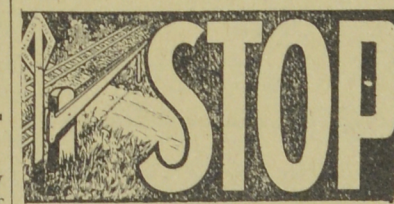
