FREDERICTON HIGH MAY LEAVE THE INTERCOLLEGIATE

Protest Against Playing of Harley by
Rothsay Collegiate School--St.
John High Remains In

The protest of Fredericton High School against Harley formerly of King's College, and now a master at Rothsay Collegiate School, playing on the Rothsay team in the Intercollegiate Rugby League probably will result in the Fredericton High withdrawing from the league. The league meeting took place in St. John Saturday when the Fredericton protest forecasted by the Mail last week, was made. As the other teams declined to entertain it with a withdrawal probably will follow.

THE MEETING

The St. John Telegraph has the following on the meeting:—"Plans for games in the Intercollegiate league were discussed Saturday morning at a meeting in the office of J. H. A. L. Fairweather, at which representatives of Fredericton High School, were present. Arrangements were made whereby games will be played, opening on October 3 at Rothsay between the local High school team and the college team, with other matches to follow on each Saturday of the following weeks until November 1, and possibly later. It is hardly likely that Fredericton will be in the league, as the representatives of the team took exception to one of the Rothsay players, contending that his college record was such that he was too fast for high school football. Those present at the meeting were: Messrs. Belts and Bridges from Fredericton; Payne and Goy, Rothsay; D. White and W. Donnelly, St. John, and J. H. A. L. Fairweather and C. M. Lawson, trustees of the Intercollegiate cup, which is now held by Fredericton, but which will have to be surrendered unless the team from the capital decides to enter.

CHANCES FOR LOCAL LEAGUE

There is a good chance for a local intermediate league if Fredericton High withdraws from the Intercollegiate, Provincial Normal, Fredericton would provide a series of matches as close and interesting as those of the Intercollegiate League. Capt. Gregory Bridges of the Fredericton High School team, has stated to The Mail that an appeal to the students of the U.N.B. would be made in the matter as they had donated the trophy for the Intercollegiate League. Fredericton High takes the ground that Harley has had such a record in intercollegiate games that it would not be fair to play him in a High School League. By league rules, however, Rothsay has a right to play one master. St. John High is to play Fredericton High here on Saturday, October 18, and Fredericton High has been requested by the other teams to reconsider its decision.

BROKEN SPINE CAUSED DEATH OF VERNER S BELVEA

Played for Norwich University--Fatally
Hurt in Match With Holy Cross
--Had Lived Here

Worcester, Sept. 26--Verner Stanley Belyea of Greenfield, left half back of the University of Norwich football team, died today in St. Vincent Hospital from a broken spine which he sustained Wednesday afternoon in a football game played by Norwich and Holy Cross on Fitton Field.

With him when the end came were his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Nehemiah Belyea of Greenfield, Coach I. R. Pray, Capt. A. B. Kimball and C. I. Smallman of the Norwich team. The parents of the young athlete were overcome by grief and returned early in the afternoon to their Greenfield home to prepare for the arrival of the body of their only son, which was shipped to Greenfield late this afternoon in charge of the Norwich team representatives.

Before leaving Worcester, the representatives of the Norwich team said all the football game on the Norwich schedule for the remainder of the year will be cancelled.

A delegation of Holy Cross students will attend the funeral in Greenfield. Belyea is the first football player who was ever seriously injured in a game at Holy Cross.

The deceased had lived in Fredericton and was well known here. He was in his senior year at Norwich. He was a nephew of Mrs. John B. Hawthorn of McAdam.
