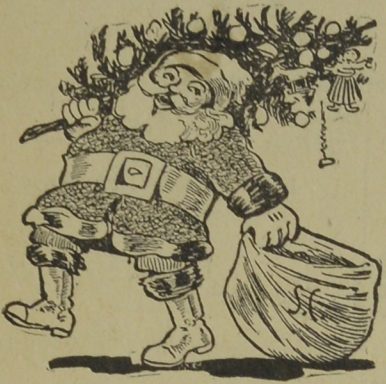

ROGERS' MACHINE METHODS AND YORK COUNTY POLITICS

We do not believe that any reliable engineer would, after a careful inspection of the Southampton spur, say that it cost \$237,280 to build. If it did cost that large sum the money must have been wasted; it certainly did not go into the road. If it did cost that large sum, then the sooner the Flemming government gets out of the railway building game, the better for the country.

THE PAST RECALLED.

The country heard a lot of talk about the Central Railway when the present local government came into power and as ex-Finance Minister Fielding says, the time has arrived when we can compare things that are with what they were to be. The Mail can well imagine the look of holy horror that would have come over the countenance of Premier Flemming had the old government come forward with a proposal to guarantee the bonds of a railway such as the Pinder spur for \$156,000. He would have made far more noise than he did when the proposal to guarantee the bonds of the International road for \$8,000 a mile was before the House. Railways were built in this province, under former governments, but none of them, if we except the old New Brunswick Railway, ever came in for such a soft snap as has been handed out to the builders of the Southampton Road. The Canada Eastern Railway, 130 miles long, was purchased by the Dominion government a few years ago for \$800,000. The International, a high-class road, received a bond guarantee of \$8,000 and a cash subsidy of \$3,200 from the provincial treasury. Coming nearer home, we have the York and Carleton Railway a line equally as good and equally as important if not more so, than the Southampton Railway. It received cash subsidies totalling \$6,000 for its nine miles and has since been maintained and operated by a private company, while in the case of the Southampton road, the owners were mighty glad to have it taken off their hands by the C.P.R. a few months after it was completed.

CHANCE FOR A COMMISSION.

The present local government, when it came into office, was strong in appointing commissions to investigate alleged railway steals. If sauce for the goose is sauce for the gander, the Southampton road would seem to be worthy of some attention of this nature. It is a small road, but it represents a big outlay of public money; some of which may not have been expended for the purpose intended. An impartial investigation would probably show that, making due allowance for Mr. Pinder's inexperience as a railway builder, that a large amount of public money has either been wasted or stolen in connection with the building of this road.

DIVORCE REFUSED

stated that the evidence of an accomplice although worthy of a certain degree of evidence was always open to suspicion and must be corroborated. In the case in question the evidence of Scott who was a son-in-law of the defendant had been too unreasonable to be accepted without corroborative evidence. His Honor stated also that the court should hesitate in regard to alleged confessions on the part of the defendant. He ordered the case dismissed.

HAWTHORNE VS. HAWTHORNE

In the case of Hawthorne vs. Hawthorne Judge McKeown stated that the evidence had shown infidelity on the part of the husband in 1893 at Maplehurst, Carleton County, and about ten years later at Fredericton, the co-respondent being the same in both instances. The first instance was sworn to by the plaintiff and the other was included in an alleged confession of the defendant to the plaintiff and evidence of the accomplice. The first was not open for ground for divorce as the plaintiff had condoned the offense. The other instance lacked corroborative evidence, as in the Leaman case. The case was dismissed.

In the suit of Alexander Magee vs. Adelaide Magee Chas. D. Richards made application to appear for the defendant. P. A. Gutrie for the plaintiff objected that he had closed his case and that the defendant had ample time to enter defence previously. His Honor reserved decision on the point.

William Magee of Harvey Station brother of the plaintiff was examined by His Honor. The witness swore that the defendant had lived at his home since 1908 having gone there to nurse his wife who had died in that year. The statement that Adelaide Magee and himself lived together as man and wife witness said was false, and said the same concerning a statement that she had given birth to two children by him. There was no further examination of the witness.

Court adjourned until January 20 when judgement will be given in suits of Blizard vs. Blizard and Fenwick vs. Fenwick.
