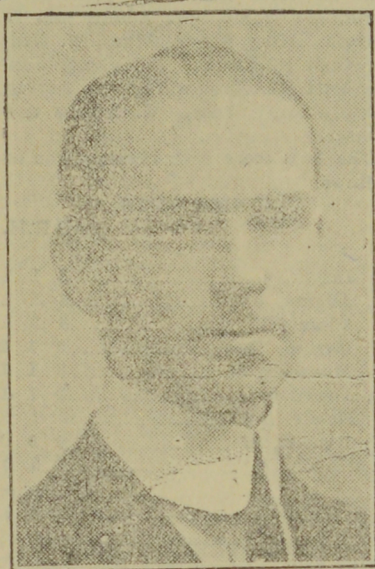

INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT NASAL ORGAN

No stove or furnace that ever was made by man can equal in efficiency the human nose. For the nose, in the space of three inches and in two seconds of time can raise the temperature of the air it draws in nearly 50 degrees, and at the same time saturate it with moisture and thoroughly purify it. It is also a perfect filter, and thus the most important guardian of the body against disease. All air that is breathed into the lungs should be at a temperature of nearly 90 degrees Fahrenheit. It should also be moist, even wet. Cold, dry air is fine for the outside of the body, but has no place in its interior. In heating the air the nose works on the principle of a steam coil. It is not merely two tubes leading up into the head, and so down to the throat, but from the bones on either side three twisted bones curl out into the passage, one above the other, each coated with elastic cushions of blood-vessels and tiny glands. These form coils with a great, hot, damp surface, over which the air spreads as it is drawn up. Thus is the air warmed for its entrance to the lungs. The entire surface of the inside of the nose is composed of a membrane that pours forth a fluid called mucus. This is composed largely of salt water, which is taken up by the passing air until this is saturated before it reaches the throat. This mucus is also a microbe-catcher and a dust catcher. Almost all the dirt and germs of disease that enter with the air through the nostrils are trapped by the mucus. The living enemies are killed, for the mucus is antiseptic and germicidal. Thus the air is heated, moistened, and purified before it reaches the lungs. Air breathed in through the mouth is not warmed, moistened or purified, except to a very slight extent. Consequently it reaches the lungs cold, dry, and laden with dust and disease. Bronchitis, tonsillitis, diphtheria, and consumption are the result.

The Real Horseman

Real horsemen are born, not made. Go into the stable and select two teams of equal merit and usefulness. Give one over to the care of a real horseman, the other to the abuse of a mere teamster, and compare results. The first named will do double the work with half the feed and keep his charges sleek, ambitious, and attractive, while the latter will not only utilize more grain and hay, but will ruin his horses by general mismanagement and abuse, and yet his work will be poorly executed. The animal that does the same kind of work every day, rain or shine, is easy to feed and care for, but the team that is idle one day and overworked the next presents a real problem. A bushel of care is worth two bushels of feed, and a combination of both is essential. Regularity of feeding, with amounts of grain and its mixture measured according to actual work done, is the only successful practice. Watering before feeding, noon and evening, and not for at least two hours after the meal, will prompt better digestion.

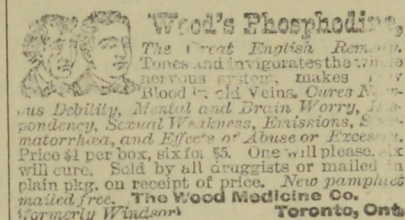
SCULLY'S GROVE SOON TO BE THING OF PAST

Land for Streets to be Deeded to
City Next Week--Other
Changes

Scully's Grove as an athletic field, will be a thing of the past by next week. The deed of the transfer of the land necessary for the extension of St. John street and the opening of McLeod and Scully streets will be given the city by the New Brunswick and British Colonization Company early next week and upon receiving the deed the city authorities will take steps to have the streets turn-piked and properly marked.

Yesterday the removal of the grand stand and bleachers of the ball grounds was begun. Other changes are also to be made. The Hamilton house, which has stood for many years between Scully's Grove and the C.P.R. tracks, is to be removed from its present site to Lot 39 on McLeod street, where it will be located, facing the railway tracks. The new site for the building is almost in the middle of the outfield of baseball grounds. The St. John & Quebec Railway Company owns the land between the Grove and the C.P.R. tracks and also a considerable portion of the Grove. This is expected to be a station-site of some kind.

The survey of the Scully property by the New Brunswick & British Colonization Company has brought out the fact that St. John street, beyond Union street, is not straight and residences on it encroach on the street. The prolongation along the eastern side of Scully's Grove will follow the proper line. A residence is now being built fronting upon this extension.
