RECORD NUMBER OF NAMES ON VOTERS' LIST

Increase of About Three Hundred Over Previous Years---Indication That Population of City is Growing Rapidly

The election list for the City of Fredericton, which is now in the printers' hands, shows the largest number of names in the history of the city. The lists for the two polling divisions will include about twenty-three hundred names. The list for No. 1 Division, comprising that part of the city west of Carleton street, contains in the neighborhood of twelve hundred names. That for No. 2 Division contains about one hundred fewer.

The list as it is now made up, is subject to alteration. Names may be taken off or added. The number of names on the preliminary list, however, may be taken as an indication that the population of the city has been added to considerably within the past year as the largest of previous lists contained about three hundred fewer names.

The electoral list which is being printed, when corrected will be that which will be followed at both provincial and dominion elections. The board of revisors is as follows:—Herbert Coulthard, chairman; Moses Mitchell, Enoch G. Hoben. The revisors are to meet on October 22nd and notice of changes in the list must be given prior to October 4th.

SENTENCED TO TWO YEARS, BUT ALLOWED TO GO

Florence Forbes, Charged With Theft Goes Free on Suspended Sentence Pending Good Behavior in Future

Florence Forbes, the eighteen-year-old Sunbury County girl charged with stealing a diamond pin valued at \$128 and a lady's gown from the home of Mr. H. G. Ripley, Regent street, on Monday last, appeared before the police magistrate yesterday afternoon. She pleaded guilty to the charge and was sentenced by the magistrate to two years' imprisonment in the penitentiary at Dorchester. Mr. P. A. Guthrie appeared as counsel for the prisoner and made a plea on her behalf. His Honor decided that she should be allowed to go on suspended sentence.

Friends of the girl have interested themselves in her behalf and an effort will be made to keep her from committing similar acts in the future. It is said that the girl did not realize the value of the gown when she took it.
