VALUABLE FISHERIES

Many Fish Found in British Columbia Waters

The fisheries of British Columbia are the most valuable in the Dominion. Of the \$35,000,000 worth of fish produced from all the Provinces in Canada in one year, this one contributed fish to the value of \$14,000,000. Salmon, halibut and herring are the three chief varieties of fish which inhabit the waters of British Columbia.

The Fraser River, especially that section of it flowing through the lower mainland, contributes most liberally to the fisheries of the Province. The salmon pack in all parts of British Columbia in a year amounted to 996,576 cases, of which the lower mainland district, including the Province's largest canneries at New Westminster, contributed 173,921 cases, or almost twenty per cent. of the entire pack.

The fishing business on "the coast" is only in its infancy. The rivers of the northern part of the interior are practically unknown, so far as their fertility is concerned, and the fishermen on the coast are only beginning to realize the immense wealth which lurks in the numerous bays and inlets of the Pacific coast.

A Share of the Catch

In the French fisheries on the Newfoundland banks the fishermen do not work for wages, but for a share in the catch. Before they leave France they receive an advance payment, varying from \$75 to \$150, to be deducted from their future earnings. If, as not infrequently happens, a man's share at the end of the season is not sufficient to cover the amount advanced to him, the owner of the vessel loses the difference, and the man himself comes home with empty pockets. The fisherman's total earnings in seven months of hard labor and exposure probably do not average more than \$150. Strangely enough, the men appear to be content with their lot, and all the reforms that have been effected toward improving their wages and the conditions under which they labor have been initiated by naval officers, administrative officials and enlightened ship-owners.

Wholesale Smuggling

Wholesale smuggling of horses, cattle and grain across the Canadian border, amounting to thousands of dollars was unearthed by Collector of Customs Judson La Moure, Jr., of the district of North and South Dakota and Northwestern Minnesota. According to information from Hallock, Minn., near the centre of the smuggling district the operations were carried on along the border between St. Vincent and Warroad, Minn. There is no customs port between these two points, which are about 100 miles apart.
