



Jeannette was in superb condition whil? his opponent did not appear well trained. Langford's weight gan to tell on him in the latter part of the contest.


Jeannette outboxed his man from the start, using a left jab to the face to good advantage. The men iought hard at close range at times. and both suffered severe body punishment.


