NEWS OF FREDERICTON TWENTY-ONE YEARS AGO

(From The Weekly Herald of Saturday, November 12, 1892.)

VICTORIA MILL—Hale & Murchie's Mill will continue sawing until the New Year. Morrison's Mill will run all winter. Thus the people of the eastern part of Fredericton will have a good winter's work.

INAUGURAL ADDRESS—Prof. Davidson will deliver an inaugural address at the College on Thursday evening next. His subject will be, "The Relation of Ethics to Political Economy."

AMICABLY ADJUSTED—The trouble between the publisher of The St. John Progress and the printers will it is thought, come to an amicable adjustment and that enterprising journal continues to find its way to its thousands of readers. (Progress was a weekly paper published at St. John by Mr. E. S. Carter.)

HE OBJECTS—Private Anderson, a deserter from Ontario, who joined the Military School here, has been sentenced to forty-five days' jail but objects to going. He is still at the guard house and it appears the military authorities are still in a quandary as to what to do with him.

FOOTBALL—The U.N.B. football team met more than they had expected at Sackville, where the ball was kept all the time in the near neighborhood of their goal and the result was seventeen points for Mt. Allison and a goose egg for U.N.B.

FOR QUEEN'S—J. DeVeber Neales has allowed himself to be selected as a sacrifice in Queen's, where Hon. A. G. Blair is seeking election. It is not yet announced what he has demanded but he has always been a supporter of the government and an office-holder. He is to be slain on the 22nd.

THE LOCAL PRESS—It is wonderful to witness the spasmodic efforts made by some of our local newspapers to declare themselves Liberal, although run by Conservative money, printing and influence and trucking to the demands of that party. They were Liberal once but it would take a very fine microscope to find anything Liberal about them at this time.

INSPECTION—On Monday afternoon General Herbert, commander-in-chief of the Canadian Forces, inspected the Infantry School and men here. He expressed himself as greatly pleased with the condition of the barracks and with the military skill and precision of the men. One of the rooms was severely condemned and there will likely be a change made.

NEW SCHOONER—John Gibson's large schooner being built at the mouth of the Nashwaak will be ready to receive the plank in a few days. All the timbers are now in position and ship-experts declare the model excellent. The intention is to have her ready for launching during the spring freshet. (This schooner was a three-master and was named the Fred H. Gibson. She was the last vessel built in this vicinity.)

TO ST. JOHN—Hon. A. G. Blair has leased the house on Wellington Row, St. John, belonging to the estate of the late T. W. Daniel.

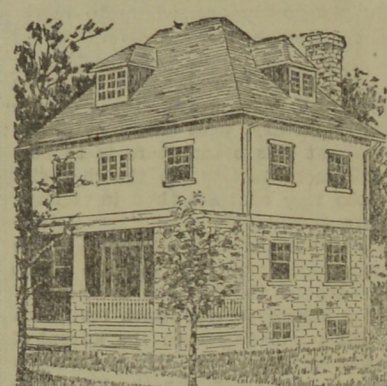

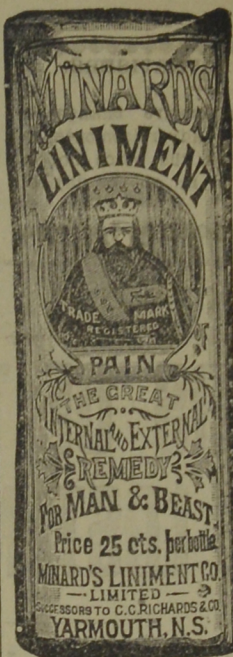
