FRUITS OF TORYISM

A good many of the troubles that are now disturbing Canada would never have been known, but for the change of parties that was made in the last election, says The St. Andrews Beacon. Nationalism in Quebec would have died a natural death and the English-speaking minority in that province would not have been compelled to go unrepresented. There would have been no naval problem to quarrel about because it would have been settled along the lines determined upon by both parties in 1909. There would not have been the waste of public moneys for drill sheds and for militia display that has marked the past two years. The people of St. John and the people of Halifax would have had their ports developed and there would have been no discriminatory rates over the I. C.R. to complain about. There would have been no such increase in general freight rates over the I.C.R. as has taken place lately and the people of Canada would still have control of that road. The farmers of Canada would have had free access to the U.S. markets with their potatoes and their turnips; there would have been no countervailing duty and no competition from the cheap labor countries of the old world. So with our fishermen. There would have been no disturbance in business to create the depression which is now being experienced in many parts of the country. The government of Canada would have been in the hands of the people and not under the control of "the interests" to use it for the advancement of the r own selfish ends. These are facts which should sink deep into the hearts and minds of Canadians.

WHAT SIR JOHN MISSED

The Albertan, Ontario, Star, of a recent date, says:

It is only twenty-two years since Sir John Macdonald passed off the scene and yet Sir John never dodged an automobile, never heard the stuttering of a motor bike, never held a strap in a trolley car, never posed for a motion picture, never posted a letter never listened to the s. eaky voice regularly for less than three cents, of a phonograph, never saw an aviator capering around in the atmosphere with a heavier-than-air machine, never dispatched a message by wireless, and never was kept awake at night by the frantic howling of an 'emergency.'"

It is true that Sir John A. missed a few things but he kept fairly well abreast of the times in all that pertains to the political game. He knew a whole lot of things concerning which the general public were kept in ignorance. If Sir John were to return to earth today he would not have much reason to feel proud of his degenerate successors who are at present misruling the country.

Hon. That it is safe to say that the visit of the cabinet ministers has fallen far short of satisfying St. John.

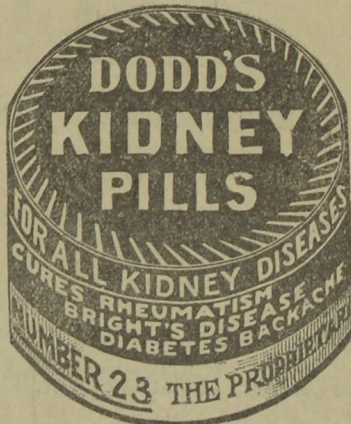
That the sports in the rural districts are not going to pay a tax of three dollars for the privilege of shooting a deer.

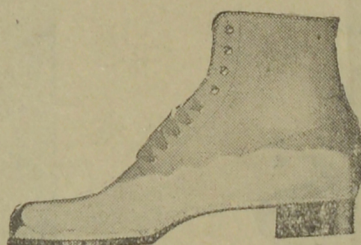
