Red and Black Squad Put Through Its Paces

BROWNVILLE BALL TEAM HAD SPLENDID RECORD

C. P. R. Beavers Put Maine Railroad Town on Baseball Map This Year--Colby University Captain James, Pitched Good Ball--Record of Games, Averages, Etc.

Brownville Junction, Me., Sept. 22 --On Saturday Sept. 13th, the C. P. R. Beavers of Brownville Junction, closed one of the most successful seasons in the history of baseball in this town, making a record that would satisfy the most ardent fans. Out of 23 games played during the season 18 were won and 5 lost.

The team was composed largely of local boys employed in the C.P.R. offices here, James, Baker and Mackin being the only boys from out of town on the team.

The pitching of James, the Colby captain-elect, was one of the chief features of the season, winning ten out of fifteen games pitched and the majority of those lost were through no fault of his. His best work for the season was against Bangor League team, whom he held to four scattered hits, striking out fifteen men, and did not issue a single pass, winning his game, 1-0.

Baker as back-stop, did good work, catching in nineteen games and batting for .309. "Dave" was in the game all the time and his work was satisfactory to all.

McClain, Evans, Roberts and York played first-class ball both at bat and in their positions in the infield, while Fischer, Allen, Mackin and Grant played practically errorless ball in the outfield.

During the greater part of the season Fischer, local pitcher, was detracted from box work on account of illness and injuries sustained in a game at McAdam Junction. He showed up strong, however, the latter part of the season and should do good work next season.

LEATA J. PRESSED HARD BY FRANK BOGASH JR.

Columbus, Ohio, Sept. 22--Leata J, a California mare, was second choice to Frank Bogash Jr in the Hotel Hartman pacing stake race that held the place of prominence on the program for the opening day of Columbus Grand Circuit racing, but she won in a five-heat struggle in which the sprinting through the stretch was a feature.

Several times this season these two pacers have met and today's victory is the third for Leata J. In the second heat she did the final quarter in 29 1/2 seconds and completed the next mile with a quarter in 23 1/2 seconds. Winning this heat gave her an advantage over Frank Bogash Jr. They did not have rush enough to overtake Del Rey in the fourth heat but was fresher in the fifth, which Leata J took, staving off her rival by a burst of speed. She was credited with pacing the last half in 100 1/2.

Directum I was a pronounced favorite for the King Pacing Stake, and won without trouble. Though the track was slow he did the third and final heat in 2:04 1/2, to keep clear of Walter Cochato and Branham Baughman.

Omar, purchased six weeks ago by Louisville, Ky., horsemen, made his first Grand Circuit start today and disposed of Nezzel, the first choice. They met in the 2:11 trot. Nezzel won the first two heats, with Omar close up. In the third heat the result was reversed and Omar did not

have much trouble in taking the next two.

Cleo B was almost overlooked in a field of thirteen 2:15 pacers, of which Princess Margaret was thought to be the best. The first two miles were won handily by Cleo B. The third heat went to Zandibar, and then the race went over for resumption tomorrow.

There certainly should have been more men out in uniform. Too many fellows who play football were waiting grandstand seats. The number who turned out and practised was under thirty. Improvement in regard to numbers is expected, however.

The coach gave some instruction in quick formation of scrimmage, tackling, passing and dribbling. He also had the squad on track practising quick getaway. He says it will be a week before he will put the squad at work actively playing.

"It is very good," was Coach Campbell's reply after yesterday's workout when asked by The Mail's sporting editor what he thought of the Red and Black material.

Harley will be remembered as the back who scored on U.N.B. here after a seventy yard run, going through the entire U.N.B. team for the score. Fredericton High wants him kept off the Rothesay team on the ground that it would be unfair to the other teams to play him.

Fredericton High is getting in some steady practise but could have larger turnouts. This season Normal School is practising by itself and it is understood will not play with High School for practise purposes, nor will meet the Yellow and Black until ready for a match game. In past years both teams used to get some good workouts by practising together.

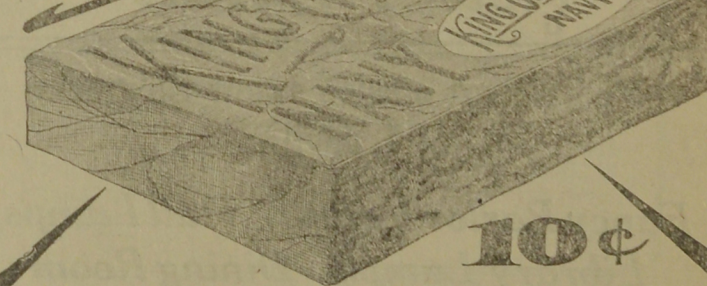
