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UNTRUTHFUL ATTACKS

Dr. Johnson, years ago, wrote that the last resort of a scoundrel was patriotism. The Canadian Conservative press has gone the great lexicographer one better. In the naval imbroglio which they so industriously created, their last resort is plain distortion of facts—a method which is sometimes called by the name of untruths. They have two stock untruths which are from time to time trotted out without any regard for facts or common sense. That is refreshingly Tory. For instance, on September 2nd, The Toronto Mail and Empire editorially declared:

"Though they shift the ground of their position from time to time, the Liberal newspapers are steadily antagonistic to the giving of naval aid to Britain. At one time they profess to be actuated by scruples as to militarism; at another by a conviction that help is not needed."

A meaner perversion of the truth could not be imagined than these efforts to spread the impression that loyalty is a private perquisite of the Tory party and that the Liberals must necessarily be tinged with disloyalty. The only newspapers in Canada that persistently take the view of which the Tory organs accuse the Liberal press are the organs of the Quebec Nationalist party. In the last campaign it has been proven that the Nationalist Anti-Imperialist propaganda among the French-Canadians, of unswerving opposition to either direct aid to Great Britain or a Canadian fleet unit was financed from the Tory war chest. The money subscribed by the Toronto and Montreal jingo protectionist millionaires to propagate the gospel of imperialism for the poor man and immense tariff-made fortunes for themselves went largely to Quebec provinces, where it was spent to spread the Nationalist arguments that Canada owes nothing to England and should give her nothing except hatred for the days when, as Deputy Speaker Blondin, Mr. Borden's supporter and friend, said, their ancestors "had to slow holes through the Union Jack to breathe the air of liberty." Could greater piece of political hypocrisy be imagined? It is on a par with that of Mr. Huntley Drimmond, the Montreal sugar king, who scattered his thousands at the last election to save his business from the reciprocity pact which would have given the people cheaper sugar and who is now spending millions made out of his highly protected industry, on American architects and American material for the sugar trusts now building at Montreal.

Then The Mail and Empire proceeds to trot out the argument that building battleships in Canada would necessitate the expenditure by the country of \$75,000,000 for a plant which would need to be continually used in the production of battleships at an enormous cost to Canada. This invention was first stated in parliament by Mr. Borden and its absurdity was promptly shown. Under the Naval Act of 1910 British firms had agreed to build the nucleus of a fleet unit in Canada at a total cost to the Dominion of a trifle over \$11,000,000. The companies were to put up their plant at St. John and on the St. Lawrence and look ahead for their profits out of future business, building both war and commercial vessels. The Laurier plan would not cost anything like the huge sums mentioned by the Tory leaders and press, while the cost of putting up the plant would be borne by the contracting companies, just as they would have done had Mr. Borden carried out the Naval Act of 1910.

The whole Tory argument reminds one of their amazing misrepresentations in 1903 regarding the probable cost of the National Transcontinental Railway. It is worthy of note that these same men who fought the N. T. R. project to the bitter end in 1903 are now pointing with pride to its approaching completion. It was Laurier who gave to Canada the National Transcontinental, whose value is

now so plain to all. It is Laurier who before long will give to Canada her own local fleet, by which she will preserve her own defensive power, encourage her own ship building industry, spend her own money in her own markets and at the same time assume her proper place in the British imperial family of nations.

The Tory members of the P. E. Island Legislature, like those in the N. B. House, are having a merry old time scrapping among themselves. A Charlottetown letter to The St. John Globe says:—"Less than two years ago in the political wave following the Dominion election the Liberals of Prince Edward Island were swept to defeat and out of thirty candidates for the local House only two survived. At that time it was predicted that the premier would find his following so unwieldy as to be unmanageable. This prediction has steadily been fulfilled." The auto question is one of the chief bones of contention, one important wing of the Conservative party declaring that the government has broken faith with the people on the subject. One member of the government has resigned and there are numerous defections among their following.

The efforts of Mr. Pinder and his friends in York County to have Hon. Mr. Morrissey "put in his place," have not borne fruit. The Hon. John is holding his job and so far he has not enlightened the premier in regard to the probable cost of the Fredericton highway bridge. The Fredericton Tories who are constantly complaining to the premier about the Chief Commissioner and his Secretary seem to be without influence.

to come here was ex-Governor Stone of Pennsylvania.

William Travers Jerome, accompanied by Franklin Kennedy, deputy attorney general of New York State, arrived here on a two-car special train at 11.05 tonight.

Ottawa, Sept. 10—The minister of justice, Hon. C. J. Doherty, who is acting minister of the interior, issued the order directing the deportation of Harry K. Thaw and explained the reasons for his action in a statement to the Canadian press today. Mr. Doherty pointed out that as acting minister of the interior it was his duty to enforce the provisions of the Immigration Act. He had done that simply and nothing more. Thaw, he said, had entered Canada illegally and a board of inquiry had ordered his deportation. From that order an appeal had been taken to himself. It had been considered and rejected and under the law the fugitive had been deported forthwith.

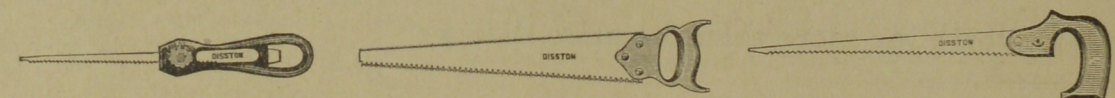
