MISSSED COBALT'S RICHES

Old French Voyageurs Knew of One Mine 150 Years Ago

That the old French voyageurs and missionaries knew of the existence of at least one mine old maps show beyond dispute. If they had extended their researches for minerals beyond the waterways and had happened upon the silver mines at Cobalt what a difference it would have made to the probable destiny of the Dominion?

The discovery of Cobalt a century and a half ago was quite within the realms of possibility, says The Cobalt Nugget. There was an old Indian trail within a few feet of Long, now Cobalt Lake, and where the Indian was wont to go, there too, the French voyageur could and did follow him. There would have been no difficulty in mining the ore. It was right on the surface and could easily have been mined and taken down in boats to Quebec. Then would the world have been astounded with the glamor of a silver Eldorado in the heart of Canada. The French king would have taken more pains to conserve the country which his predecessor had valued as so many arpent of snow, and the destiny of the Dominion might have fallen along quite other lines.

RAND HIGH-GRADERS

Precious Metal Stolen After it Leaves the Stamps

Most people have heard of I. D. B. (illicit diamond buying), a crime which in South Africa is punished with penal servitude on the break water at Cape Town.

The Rand, however, has the lesser-known offence of I. G. B. (illicit gold buying). Considering that in the Rand mines only a few pennyweights of gold go to a ton of quartz, it is obvious that the miner does not get much chance of stealing the precious metal. When does the gold thief get his opportunity?

The pieces of quartz are ground into dust by powerful hammers known as "stamps." Water then washes the dust over inclined plates coated with amalgam. The gold instantly combines with the mercury in the amalgam, afterwards being easily separated by chemical process.

It is of this gold-laden amalgam that the dishonest employe will scrape off portions which, though small, will mount up to a good bit of gold in time.

The claim which was made by ship owners and others, and which has been confirmed to a considerable extent by official records kept by the Marine and Fisheries Department of the Dominion, that the level of the river and Great Lakes is being constantly lowered, principally by drainage operations on a large scale, is to be thoroughly tested by a Commission appointed by the Canadian Government. Gauges were placed at various points between Port Arthur and Quebec to make the required tests.

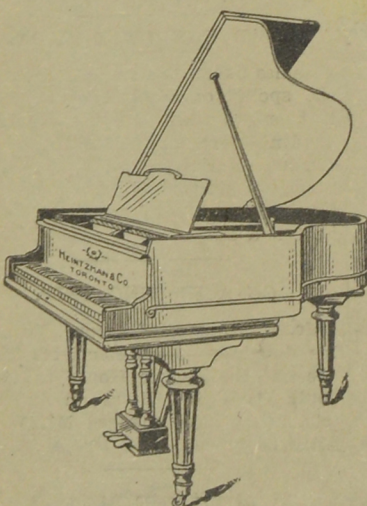
