THAW'S LAWYERS WON ANOTHER VICTORY

bail on a charge that he had played poker yesterday on railroad property with some newspaper men. Then came word that Thaw's lawyers had obtained in Montreal a writ variously described here as one of habeas corpus, prohibition and restraint, demanding Thaw's production in court there forthwith.

Meanwhile the special board of inquiry ordered Thaw's deportation to Vermont under two clauses of the Immigration Act, namely, that he had entered Canada by stealth and had, within five years, been an inmate of an institution for the insane. From both these decisions Thaw's lawyers appealed, then clinched matters with a notice by telegraph that the writ had been granted in Montreal.

APPEAL STAYS DEPORTATION.

The immigration officers, headed by E. Blake Robertson, were inclined to ignore any court order coming over the wire but they were powerless in the matter of the appeal, and Thaw remained in the detention room over the Grand Trunk Railway station. Finally the Thaw lawyers in Montreal, J. N. Greenshields and N. K. Laflamme, chartered a special train and began a race here with the writ itself.

Jerome's arrest was due to two causes and was not prompted in any way by the Thaw lawyers. One and all, they expressed indignation at the move and said they were ready to aid him. What the arrest really signifies was the state of opinion here, as decidedly pro-Thaw and more decidedly anti-Jerome.

NO TURKEY TROT

Reports that the turkey-trot was to be introduced at the A. & B. Club dances are incorrect. The chairman of the committee in charge of the dances, Mr. J. Stewart Neill, has informed the Mail that no objectionable dances of any kind will be allowed at the club house. The rumor arose from the fact that two male performers at local picture houses gave a private exhibition of the turkey-trot at the club house some days ago.

W.C.T.U. COLUMN

A FEW FACTS RELATING TO THE TEMPERANCE MOVEMENT

A lady who a short time ago returned from Athens, Georgia, where she spent five months, and in that city of 20,000 inhabitants she did not see one person that was drunk. The State is under prohibition, and in the future the enforcement of this law will not be so difficult since by a recent law wet States are no longer allowed to send liquor into dry ones. In the Union nine whole States are dry, and out of ninety two millions of people forty seven millions are living under laws that prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors, and they have no canteen.

At the recent conference of the Dominion Alliance in Montreal some startling facts were brought out. Canada has a much smaller consumption of liquor per head than most other countries. In the Dominion the average consumption per per head per annum, was only 6 1/2 gallons as compared with 22 gallons in the United States, 35 gallons in England and 50 gallons in Belgium. All Nova Scotia is under prohibition with the exception of Halifax. The whole of Prince Edward Island is under it. Quebec contains 1,158 municipalities and of these 859 had adopted prohibition, largely Mr. Spence said through the influence of the Catholic clergy. John N. Roberts, temperance organizer for Quebec said the government of their province was a declared partizan of the temperance cause and soon they were going to give the world a lesson in co-operative work, when French and English, Roman Catholic and Protestant would join against the curse of drink. In the House of Commons in England there was a labor party of fifty who were all teetotallers, and the government subsidized a temperance association which operated in every regiment at home and abroad. The drink bill of England is rapidly decreasing. The House of Commons recently passed a bill closing 35,000 saloons within a short term, but the House of Lords threw it out. Is it surprising that Mr. Asquith has intimated that next year they would abolish the obstructive institution.

Some contend that this revenue from the traffic is necessary for the support of schools. Mrs. D. K. Livingston in reply to this said that in Kansas which is dry, they had a surplus of \$11,000,000 for their schools, and there are more teachers and scholars in proportion to the population than in any other state. One could go through 47 counties and not find a poor house with any inmates. In the United States 97 per cent of the dependent classes were victims of drink. Surely she said it was time to get rid of the wretched poverty, crime and disease which is the result of the legalized liquor traffic. Never before had there been so much written and told of that infamy of infamies the traffic in women, to the close connection of which with the liquor traffic people are awakening. Mr. Spence said, "all doctors had defined alcohol as a poison; as deadly as strychnine or Paris green or anything used to kill rats. It was not a food, it neither warmed or built up the body." Next the defenders of alcohol said it was a stimulant to tone up the stomach and digestion; but what were the facts? Alcohol did three things: it inflames the stomach, hardens it and makes digestion difficult, and deadens the nerves so that the victim does not know what is going on, it rendered the blood impure. Alcohol affected the whole body, but the brain most of all, it being paralyzed by this insidious drug. And of all the tins our poor humanity can commit there is no sin of which it is truer that the sins of the fathers are visited on the children. Of 300 idiots in the Massachusetts asylum 140 had drunken parents.

In the latest civil service regulation issued in the United States we find the following: "No one will be eligible to hold the position of postmaster who is insane, an ex-convict, who has been dishonorably discharged from the army or navy, or who drinks intoxicating liquor." Such an enactment would disqualify some of the highest officials in our province. It places the moderate drinker in bad company.

Cambridge, Mass., has the honor of giving the public the first municipal poster against alcoholism that has ever been issued on this continent. Printed in striking form, it has been placed by authority of the Mayor and Park Commissioners in all parks and public buildings. Under a large type heading of the word alcohol the poster reads: "The public thinks it is only heavy drinking that harms. Experiments show that even moderate drinking hurts health, lessens efficiency. The public thinks Alcohol braces us for hard work and against fatigue. Experiments show that alcohol in no way increases muscular strength or endurance. Alcohol lowers vitality! alcohol opens the door to disease. Resolved, at the International Conference on Tuberculosis, 1905, to combine the fight against alcohol with the struggle against tuberculosis. At the Massachusetts General Hospital, Boston, the use of alcohol as a medi-
