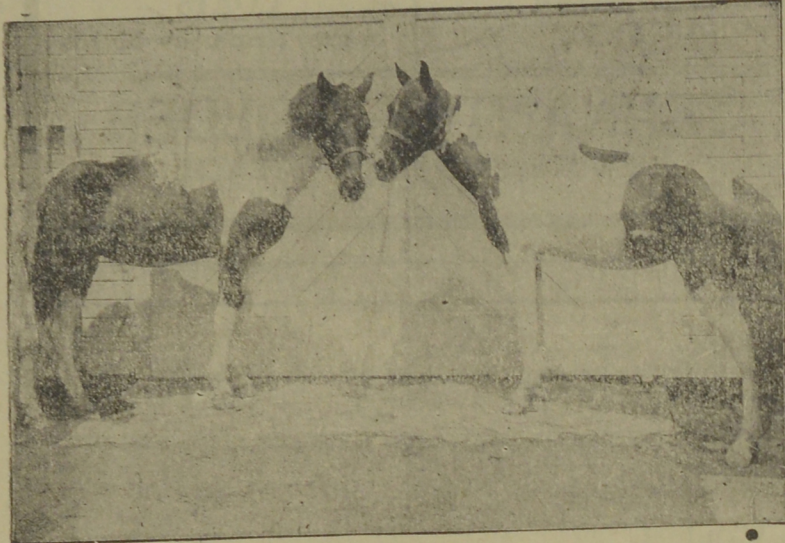


## Nine Rules for the SECOND -GRAND- Pony Contest

### - RULES FOR A DUNLAP PONY COMMERCIAL CONTEST -

RULE 1.—Any child not over sixteen years of age who is not a child of any employee connected with Business House mentioned in Folders or grandchild or niece or nephew of any of the participating merchants, may become a Contestant in the DUNLAP PONY COMMERCIAL CONTEST by enrolling his or her name at the places of business of all of the merchants who are joint participants in this Contest.

RULE 2.—For all money paid to any of the participating merchants during the progress of this Contest, either on old accounts or on cash business, 25 votes shall be given for each 25 cents so paid; 10 vote coupons and 5 vote coupons may be used at the discretion of the merchant.

RULE 3.—Under no consideration shall the schedule mentioned above be changed nor shall any additional votes be awarded by any merchant at any time during the progress of the Contest. No coupons except those printed by THE DUNLAP PONY COMPANY shall be considered valid coupons.

RULE 4.—A sealed ballot box shall be placed in the store or office of each participating merchant for the reception of said votes. Said box shall be opened by said merchant in exactly two weeks from the date on which this Contest starts. The votes contained in said box shall be counted by him or by parties selected by him and the result of said counting shall be kept a secret.

RULE 5.—Said ballot box shall be opened every two weeks thereafter during the progress of the Contest; the ballots counted in like manner and the result thereof kept a secret.

RULE 6.—As an incentive to the early casting of votes and to facilitate the counting thereof, the following bonuses shall be given. The votes cast for each Contestant during the first period shall be increased 50 per cent. In other words, if Contestant A has 100,000 votes and Contestant B 90,000 votes, 50 per cent. shall be added to the vote of each so that A will be credited with 150,000 and B with 135,000 votes.

RULE 7.—The votes cast for each Contestant during the second period shall be increased 40 per cent.; the votes cast for each Contestant during the third period shall be increased 30 per cent.; the votes cast for each Contestant during the fourth period shall be increased 20 per cent.; the votes cast for each Contestant during the fifth period shall be increased 10 per cent.; the votes cast for each Contestant during the last period shall not be increased at all.

RULE 8.—At the conclusion of the Contest three disinterested judges shall be selected by said merchants who shall tabulate the results certified to them by each participating merchant and shall award the Grand Prize of the Shetland Pony, Carriage or Sleigh and Harness to the child who has received the greatest number of votes.

RULE 9.—Each merchant agrees to carefully keep his records and not to divulge the contents thereof to any Contestant, to any of their friends or to any other participating merchant. By so doing no one will know who is in the lead at any stage of the Contest.

## SMASHUP IN FREE-FOR-ALL AT CALAIS EXHIBITION

Bingen the Great Awarded Fourth  
Heat And Won Race—Lady Fondly  
Won 2.25 Pace

Calais, Me., Sept. 5.—There was excitement enough in the harness racing at the Calais fair grounds this afternoon to satisfy the most enthusiastic seeker after thrills, the free-for-all, with four starters, winding up in the fourth heat with a collision between Thoughtful and Flora P., which was forced on when O'Flanagan the St. Stephen chestnut gelding, driven by Dan Groves of Calais, made an attempt to go from fourth position to the pole at the start of the final heat. Both Thoughtful and Flora P. were thrown and their sulks wrecked but the drivers escaped with only a shaking up. O'Flanagan again came into collision with Bingen the Great, his only competitor left in the race, and was nearly thrown but recovered and won the heat which was, however, given to Bingen the Great, owned by F. C. Murchie of Milltown, N.B., who drove him.

The other event, the 2:25 pace, also went to a New Brunswick horse, Lady Fondly, which won in straight heats, Weary Willie, owned by W. G. Fenwick of Bathurst, getting second money.

## DRIVER FRED WARREN THROWN AT HALIFAX

Nose Broken and Face Cut—Baring's Comet Won  
Three-Year-Old Trot—Fredericton Horse Won  
2:27 Trot—Dan Paine Won Race in Which  
Smashup Occurred

Halifax, Sept. 5.—The horse races on the exhibition track today were marred by a serious accident in the first heat of the 2:40 pace, when four horses got in a mix-up on the first turn and all fell in the centre of the track. Fred Warren of Sydney, the driver of Tommy Cotter, was picked up unconscious. His nose was broken and his face terribly cut. He was taken to the hospital. Hammond Kelly of Charlottetown, driver of Moth Miller, was also hurt but not seriously. None of the horses were injured badly. All bikes were smashed. Dan Paine of Sydney, won the race. Worroway of Fredericton, won the 2:27 trot after Cochoato Lady took first heat. Baring's Comet, owned by H. Musgrave, won the three-year-old trot in straight heats.

Eddie Collins, the star second sacker of the Athletics, tops the list of run-getters in the major leagues.

Arthur Devlin, the former New York-Boston infielder, has joined the Rochester team of the International League.

Denver has a big lead in the Western League race, with Lincoln and Des Moines fighting it out for second place.

Shortstop Jack Barry of the Athletics, has been engaged to manage the Meriden, Conn., roller polo team next winter.

Pitcher Monroe of the Lexington team, who is one of the bright stars of the Ohio State League, has been purchased by the Chicago White Sox.

Ames is pitching better ball for the Cincinnati team than he did for the Giants, and Fromme is doing better work for the Giants than he did for the Reds.

In McQuillan, Cooper, Adams and Robinson, Pittsburgh has four pitchers who are among the dozen flingers leading in the National League.

It is said that John McGraw, the Giants' boss, has not abandoned the hope of putting over a trade whereby he can land Ed Konetchy of the Cardinals.

Bert Shotton has been doing fine work for the St. Louis Browns this season. Shotton and Manager Storvall are the only Browns who are hitting in the .300 list.

The chase for the American Association pennant is waxing hot. The first four teams, Milwaukee, Minneapolis, Louisville and Columbus, are bunched and travelling fast.

Walter Johnson of Washington, and Ray Collins of the Red Sox, have engaged in three great pitching duels this season, each resulting in a 1 to 0 score. Collins copied two the games and Johnson one.

Had Ed Walsh been able to take his regular turn in the box this season, the chances are that the White Sox probably would be giving the Athletics a hard run for the American League honors just now.

President Tobean and Manager Carr of the Kansas City Club, have been putting over some classy deals of late. They have traded Jim Vaughn to the Cubs for Lew Richie and the price of another player, "Cy" Morgan to the Cincinnati Reds for a player and \$7,500 in cash, Jimmy Breton to the White Sox for Rath, Lange and Mattick, and Clarence Walker to the Browns for Compton.
