TOMMY BURNS WILL

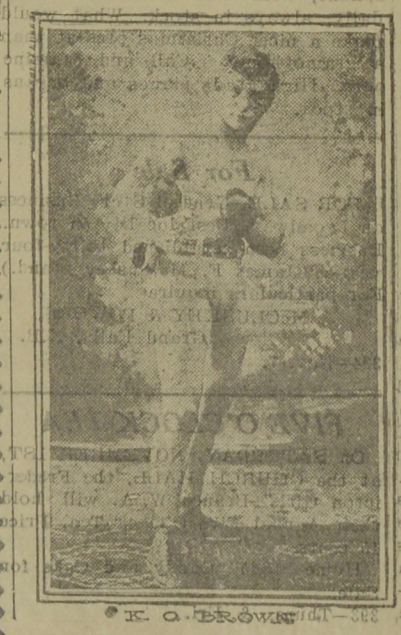
NOT HAVE TO BE TRIED

Reno, Nev., Oct. 29—The New Zealand All-Blacks, playing the Rugby game, this afternoon defeated Nevada 55 to 0.

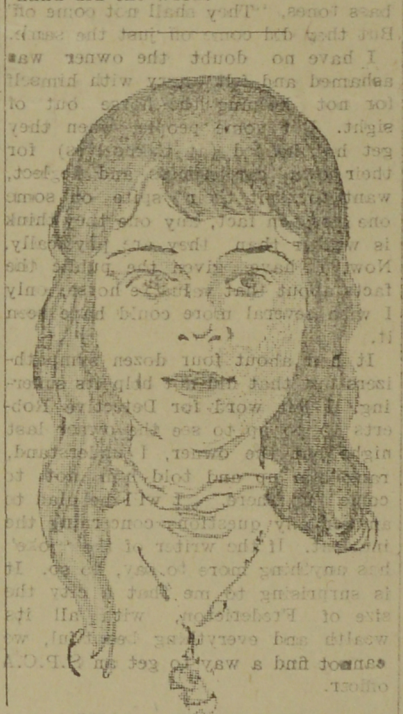


JOE RIVERS SHOWED

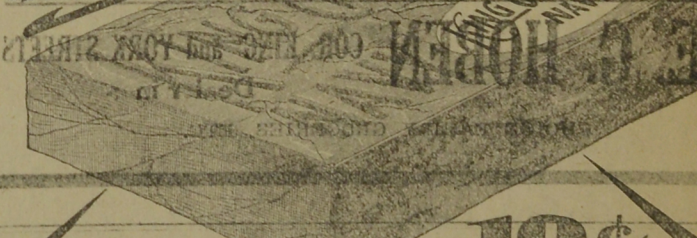
