EVIDENCE IN
BLIZZARD DIVORCE
CASE TAKEN

Mrs. Clara Blizzard of this City Plaintiff Tells of Marital Troubles—Defendant Now Living in St. John

The Divorce Court resumed this morning, no business being before the court yesterday afternoon. The cases in which P. A. Guthrie appears as counsel were begun. The first was that of Clara Blizzard vs William H. Blizzard. The plaintiff resides in this city and the defendant in St. John. The co-respondent is a Miss Weasel, who formerly resided here with the defendant and later lived with him in Gibson and St. John.

The plaintiff went on the stand and swore that she had been married to the defendant in 1907 by Rev. Allan A. Rideout. He had become addicted to the use of liquor and besides getting drunk had ill-treated the plaintiff. After living with the plaintiff for a few months he deserted her. He lived at Morrison Mills with his mother for a while and afterward with the co-respondent. Afterward he lived with the co-respondent at Gibson in a house rented from Mrs. Hyde. After that he removed to St. John, taking up his residence there in August last.

Mrs. Hyde was the next witness. She corroborated the evidence of the plaintiff with regard to the defendant and co-respondent living together in a house in Gibson rented from her.

R. W. L. Tibbitts, deputy provincial secretary, swore that Rev. Allan A. Rideout at the time the marriage was performed was registered and licensed to solemnize marriages in the Province of New Brunswick.

Judgment was reserved. This afternoon the case of Magee vs Magee is being heard.

WANT RESIDENCE
OF GOVERNOR TO
BE IN THIS CITY

Agitation Redoubled as Result of Conference of Premiers at Ottawa—Daughters of Empire are Active in the Matter

The announcement that the Dominion subsidy to the province will be increased as one result of the conference of provincial premiers held at Ottawa this week has given renewed energy to those who have advocated the restoration of Old Government House as the official residence of the Lieutenant-governor of New Brunswick. The Daughters of the Empire have interested themselves in this matter and circulated a petition for the restoration of that historic building. The petition was very largely signed.

This organization also donated a prize for the best essay by pupils of Grade VIII in the schools of the city, upon Old Government House.

It is understood that an increase in the salary of His Honor the Lieutenant Governor will be provided for by the increase in the subsidy. It is thought that such an increase would be sufficient for the maintenance of the gubernatorial residence in this city.

The campaign in favor of the restoration of Old Government House will now be pressed with vigor. Already it has met with strong support in this section.

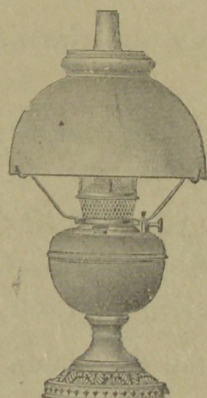
