NO REPRIMAND FOR POLICEMAN AFTER INQUIREY

Police Commission Heard Complaint Against Policeman Roberts---Officer Found to be Within His Rights in Matter

The Police Commission, at its regular semi-monthly session yesterday afternoon, investigated the complaint of United States Consular Agent Heard in regard to Special Policeman Roberts. His Worship Mayor Hooper, when asked by the reporter of The Mail this morning what had been the result, replied:

"The matter has been settled amicably."

Mr. Heard complained of the policeman taking hold of him and threatening to arrest him if he had to tell him again to stop smoking on the steps leading to the City Opera House. The incident occurred at the main entrance to the Opera House some weeks ago between the acts of a performance of "The Pink Lady."

Mr. Heard states that he had not previously been warned not to smoke.

Both Policeman Roberts and Mr. Heard were before the Police Commission yesterday and stated their sides of the matter. The incident is not regarded as closed and as no reprimand is given the officer, it is considered that he is supported in the matter.

Besides considering this incident the commissioners considered the status of Special Policeman Roberts when on duty at the City Opera House. It was decided that under such circumstances he was under the control of the Police Commission as according to the terms of his engagement he is
