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TAYES STILL GROWING

Official figures for the financial year ending March 31st, as announced by the minister of finance a few days ago, should prove of interest to the people who pay the bills. Hon. Mr. White's statement is ingenious. The heavy increase in capital and current expenditures, he naively remarks, is offset by expanding revenue. "Expanding revenue" is Hon. Mr. White's honeyed phrase for increased taxation.

On consolidated fund—that is taxation—the revenue totaled \$168,600,000 compared with \$136,108,217 the previous year. This means that during the twelve months the Borden government took out of the pockets of the taxpayers exactly \$32,491,783 more than they extracted in the first partial year of his government, when expenditures were still kept down by the retiring Liberal government.

The current expenditure was \$112,800,000 as compared with \$98,161,446 for the previous year. That is to say the government spent just \$13,838,554 on ordinary accounts more than in the previous year. To this, however, must be added the expenditure on capital and special accounts, amounting to \$32,300,000, making a total on these accounts of more than \$144,000,000. This enormous expenditure on capital account is the more remarkable because the spending on the National Transcontinental Railway construction was very much reduced, as the road is rapidly approaching completion.

If any ordinary business man, with heavy liabilities (as Canada has), should have a year of unusual prosperity he would use his surplus earnings to wipe off his outstanding liabilities as far as possible. The Borden government system is to use the "expanded revenue" for new expenditures of every kind. Instead of reducing expenditure and taxation in view of the great financial straits, the government is heaping extravagance upon extravagance, taxation upon taxation, and trusting to luck to hang on to power until they leave a legacy of debt and unwise expenditure for their successors. It will be fortunate for the taxpayers if these successors come before Hon. Mr. Rogers and his spendthrift friends complete their work.

WHAT TORIES DID NOT DO

A great number of Tory orators addressed Orange meetings all over Canada on the twelfth inst. A careful perusal of their speeches fails to show one in which reference was made to the fact that before last election the Tory workers throughout Ontario gave whispered promises that if Mr. Borden were returned to power the first thing he would do would be to rush through parliament a uniform marriage law, and if this were found unconstitutional, Mr. Borden would immediately change the constitution so as to get it through. Not a single Tory orator was manly enough to say that Mr. Borden did nothing of the sort. Not a single Tory orator was man enough to say the result showed the Laurier government in the right of the matter and that the Borden campaign whisperers had deliberately deceived the people in order to get their support. Not a single Tory orator had the decency to say that when the Lancaster Uniform Marriage Bill was introduced into parliament shortly after his first session opened, it was Mr. Borden who himself killed it.

The Tory Newcastle Advocate commenting on an agitation being carried on at Chatham to invite Hon. Mr. Hazen to visit that town and save the Chelmsford section of the I.C.R. ridicules such a proposal. The Advocate points out that Hon. Mr. Hazen is a Cabinet Minister and should not be called to Chatham to deal with a parochial matter. The Advocate is entirely wrong. The people of Chatham have a perfect right to call in Hon. Mr. Hazen as

their representative in the Cabinet, and ask him to take steps to prevent a grievous wrong from being perpetrated. In this country the people are supposed to rule and not the politicians. Hon. Mr. Hazen is every day called upon to deal with matters which are infinitesimal in comparison with the outrage which the government is perpetrating on fifteen hundred residents of the County of Northumberland.

Political events produce strange bed fellows. When the Borden naval tribute bill was before the Canadian senate, the Liberal majority there decided that the senate should not further deal with it until the judgment of the people had been secured. A few days ago the Tory majority in the House of Lords in England, by an immense majority, refused to proceed with consideration of the Irish Home Rule bill "until it had been submitted to the judgment of the country." Government by the people, for the people, has evidently found strong defenders in the upper chambers of the British empire.

It has been arranged to have Attorney General Gribble remain in the local government until December when he will be appointed to the Supreme Court bench in succession to Chief Justice Barker. In the meantime Mr. Crockett will get a judgeship, Mr. Pinder will get the Tory nomination for Ottawa and Mr. McLeod will not get the Attorney Generalship.

It is almost time the I.C.R. authorities were doing something to provide better facilities at the I.C.R. station for handling freight. A box car is all right in its place, but is scarcely a fit substitute for a freight shed in a city of the size and importance of Fredericton. The present system, or rather lack of system is causing great inconvenience to shippers and importers.

It is said that Mr. A. R. Slipp, M.P., for Queens would not be unwilling to get out of the local house while the going is good and contest York for Ottawa. The party might do worse than offer the nomination to Mr. Slipp.

Mr. O.S. Crockett, M.P., is pulling wires for a seat on the Supreme Court bench, and Hon. H. F. McLeod is trying to land the office of Attorney General. In neither case apparently is the office seeking the man.

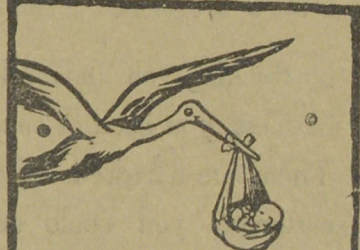
