### CAMELS ONCE LIVED IN ARCTIC CIRCLE

Waples, N. H., July 26—Copley Amory, jun., of the National Museum staff, has given an interesting account of his discovery of the fossil foot bone of a camel in the northern part of Yukon territory.

"The object of my trip," Mr. Amory said, "was to obtain mammal specimens for the National Museum along the western portion of the Alaskan-Yukon boundary, which was then being surveyed by a joint American and Canadian party. I went up the Porcupine River and reached New Rampart House on the boundary, about 160 miles south of the Arctic, early in July. With a trapper and three dogs I crossed the mountains to the survey base on the Old Crow River, sixty miles to the north, and thence travelled toward the Arctic with a pack train.

"In August, 45 miles northwest of New Rampart, I came into herds of migrating caribou and got some good specimens. The survey, however, had come out before I had got what I wanted, so I built a boat and came down the 300 miles of the Old Crow to its confluence with the Porcupine early in September with my guide. The river flows mostly through the Crow flats, an endless expanse of level, and its course, in consequence, is more tortuous than a corkscrew.

"In Dawson and along my route I had seen and heard of many fossil finds of Elephas primigenius, bison and horse and members of the survey had spent their leisure time working knickknacks out of fossil ivory which they came across polling the Old Crow.

"One day the river made a particularly sharp bend around a flat bar. On examination this proved to be a regular boneyard of fossils. I went ashore and gathered the more distinctive looking smaller specimens, the larger apparently being mammoth remains, and threw into the bottom of my canvas boat as many as it would carry. I had no idea at the time that what I had picked up was of any particular interest. When I got to the mouth of the Old Crow I met the Canadian survey launch, and went down the Porcupine River to Fort Yukon, and thence via Dawson to Vancouver, after a very interesting trip."

#### QUANTITIES OF BERRIES.

Globe—Large quantities of berries were brought to the city Friday afternoon on the river steamers. Strawberries were sold for 14 cents a box, raspberries also at 14 cents a box, blueberries for 10 cents and gooseberries for 11 and 12 cents a box. The price of new potatoes took a slump during the past week, dropping nearly one dollar a bushel. A large quantity of them were brought down river on the steamers and sold for 75c a bushel. The countrymen state that the crop this year is exceptionally good.

### M. LABORI IS VISITING CANADA

Quebec, July 23—M. Fernand Labori, the distinguished French advocate, was the guest of Sir Lomer Gouin today at a luncheon at the Garrison Club, where a number of prominent Quebec gentlemen, including the Lieut.-Governor, Sir Francois Langelier, and members of the Judiciary met. Subsequently H. Labori, Madame Labori and their three daughters were entertained at Spencerwood by Sir Francois and Lady Langelier.

M. Labori, in an interview, said he had come to Canada in response to an invitation, from the American Bar to be present at their annual meeting in Montreal in September. He will remain in Quebec a few days and then proceed to Montreal, and is likely to go to Ottawa, when he will pay his respects to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, whom he had met in France. He will also visit the important cities of Canada, and intends to go to the Pacific Coast and on the way visit his brother-in-law, Mr. Wilfrid Ryan, at Fort William, Ont. He will return to France by way of New York.

Mme. Labori is of Irish parentage her maiden name being O'Kee. She was born in Australia, but spent most of her life in Paris, where M. Labori met and wed her. She is well-known in Paris as a musician and composer. Among her works are "Les Elfs," a lyric poem with chorus, and a successful opera "Hyatha."
