With this glass it is said he can see to a depth of from six to twenty fathoms in the clear West Indian Waters. When a turtle that seems desirable

is seen the net is carefully lowered and dropped over the game. The turtle attempts to escape, but become entangled in the mesh and is soon landed in the boat.




