## ANCIENT SURGERY

Bone-setting Practised in Egypt Six  
Thousand Years Ago

At a lecture delivered in London, Dr. F. M. Sandwith, consulting surgeon to the Khedive of Egypt, said that the first surgeon of whom he could find any record lived at the time of the fifth Egyptian dynasty, and must have been court doctor to the Pharaoh some 4,000 years before the Christian era.

The first surgical implements of which anything was known, said Dr. Sandwith, were splints found in the Nubian Desert. In one place a graveyard was found, and here were remains of bodies with fractured limbs that had been set with bark splints. One was a right thigh bone that had been broken, and was still held in position by a workmanlike splint and bandages.

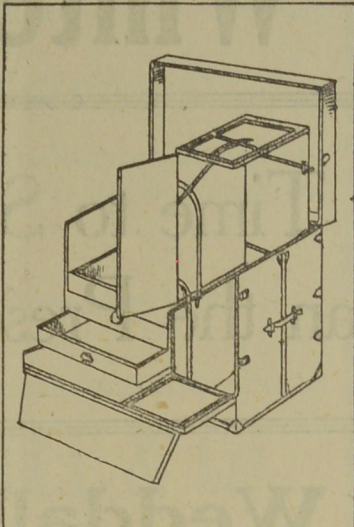
All the knots were true reef knots, and the wrapping showed how the strips of palm fiber cloth were set just as a good surgeon would set them nowadays, so as to use the full strength of the fabric.

In other cases, bodies were found with compound fractures, where the broken ends of the bone had broken through the skin. Death seemed to have come very quickly after an accident of this kind, for no trace of healing of the bones was to be found.

Comforts of Home

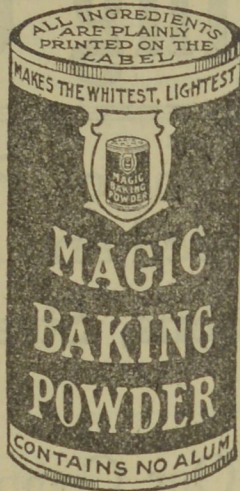
Since the wardrobe trunk was first invented there have been many variations, and one of the latest is that shown in the picture. This is not like the usual wardrobe trunk—tall and vertical in position. It is substantially square in shape, but when opened up it forms a regular dresser and has a compartment that rises to twice its normal height and provides

## INSECT TOBACCO USERS

Growers Wage Continual Warfare  
Against Hornworms

Growers of dark tobacco in Kentucky and Tennessee have a serious problem in the ever-present hornworms which are great chawers of green tobacco. When labor was plentiful and cheap, "hand worming" was an economical and efficient way to combat the pest. For several years labor in these tobacco-growing districts has been scarce, so growers were forced to resort to insecticides. Naturally, Paris green was tried and found to be the safest and most efficient of any on the market, but there has always been complaint of frequent and serious burning of tobacco as a result of its use.

For five years employees of the Department of Agriculture at Washington conducted investigations looking for a safe and effective insecticide, and they determined that di-plumbic arsenate of lead meets all requirements.

## FORETOLD A CHANGE

Canadian Soldier Saw That Mounted  
Riflemen Would be Supreme

Some thirty-six years ago, Col. G. T. Denison, Toronto's police magistrate wrote a book, "A History of Cavalry," and entered it in a competition inaugurated by the Russian War Department, by authority of Emperor Alexander II., for the best history of cavalry. There were three prizes, and Colonel Denison, in competition with the world, won the first prize—5,000 roubles. There never had been before and there never has been since any such complete work on the subject. And, furthermore, a principle which he advocated—a principle revolutionizing the cavalry service—and which he claimed would be the basis of future military mounted operations—has proven sound and has been universally adopted.

With the perfection of firearms, Col. Denison foresaw a coming change in cavalry tactics. He prophesied that cavalry would be armed with firearms, that the sword and the lance would fall into disuse, that cavalry would not be used to beat down an enemy by shock, but would be in effect mounted infantry. This contention—regarded as mistaken or absurd by most military authorities when Colonel Denison's book first appeared—has been proven sound by modern war.

In the Boer War and the Russo-Japanese War, the mounted rifles won the day. The sword and lance were nowhere. The rifle was supreme.

Yet nearly forty years ago Colonel Denison had foretold what the professional soldiers of Europe failed to see clearly. He said: "In the next great war whichever nation employs mounted rifles extensively will be found winning decisive campaigns by the wise adoption of a necessary reform."

## PENALTY OF GENIUS

Genius and ill-health, it would seem, often go hand in hand. At any rate, many of the greatest deeds that the world has seen performed have been accomplished by men physically infirm.

Darwin suffered so acutely from nervous exhaustion that he could only work for two hours a day at the most. Thackeray was frequently ill; Johnson nearly always in poor health; Dickens at the age of fifty-five was an old man, with shattered nerves; whilst Sir Walter Scott, a subject to spasms, was a chronic invalid during the later years of his life, and died at the age of fifty-nine.

Milton, William Morris, and Charles Keane, the actor, all were slaves to gout, and Milton was further handicapped by being blind. The poet Keats died of consumption when still quite young. Elizabeth Barrett Browning was an invalid for the greater part of her life.

## A Mountain of Borax

## CHEAP FARES TO TORONTO EXHIBITION.

All tickets are good to return September 10. Maritime Province travellers will have their choice of two through vestibuled trains, the Ocean Limited and the Maritime Express, both of which connect at Bonaventure union station, Montreal, with the through Grand Trunk trains for Toronto. It will be well for intending travellers to apply early for reservations.

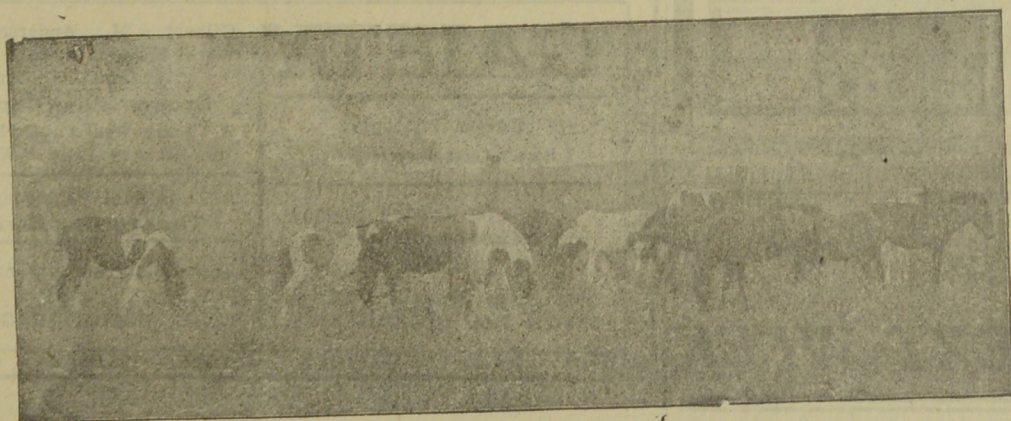
