Pets Came Back Beating Bangor 5 to 1

FAVORITES WON
AT ROCKINGHAM
PARK YESTERDAY

Track Was Heavy--Peter Volo Beaten
by Airdale in First Heat of Horse
Breeder's Futurity

Salem, N. H., Aug. 20--Over a heavy, tiring track, the Grand Circuit horses filled their second day's engagement at Rockingham Park today before 25,000 spectators. The winners outclassed the fields and favorites won. Frank Bogash Jr. was the star of the "White Washington," as it was only a question of how fast his opponents could make him go. Stetbrino Lad came next to the winner the first two heats while in the third Walter Cox brought Del Ray up into the place.

Walter Cochato romped away with the "Hub." Jones Gentry made a good try in the initial heat and Longworth B. came out of the ruck in the second, but the best he was capable of was lapping the son of Cochato at the wire.

If Murphy had not underestimated the brush of Airedale he would have taken the American Horse Breeders' Futurity for trotting foals of 1911, with Peter Volo, the world's champion trotting colt of his age, in straight heats. In the opening session he fell short by a head. After that he won as he liked.

James W., owned by James Kimball of Haverhill, Mass., had no trouble in annexing the 210 trot and Baron Penn was as handily second in each heat.

Fredericton Gave Imitation of Blowup in Third Inning But Then Settled Down--"Pete" Condon Pitched Great Game--Danny Donovan, Recruit Pitcher Twirled for Two Innings and Showed Something--Cooney Replaced by Wallace--St. Croix Trimmed Greeks in Slugging Match at St. John

While St. Croix was trimming St. John in a game that resembled a cricket match as far as the scoring and batting is concerned, the Pets put one over on Bangor at the local ball-yard yesterday to the tune of 5 to 1. The visitors had just come from a whitewashing festival at St. John and might have felt a trifle cocky. If they did the feeling was taken out of them in short order.

They scored their one lone tally in the first and in the second filled the bases but the Pets averted any more scores after giving a dangerous exhibition of an approach to the balloon ascension of Tuesday. Pitcher Cooney was batted out of the box by the Pets, retiring in favor of Wallace after the fifth. He allowed six hits but "Dandy" Wallace had something on it and was touched for a lone bingle in three innings. "Pete" Condon pitched great ball for seven innings, allowing only four hits. His team-mates apart from the three "barries" that came in a bunch in the third, backed him up perfectly.

With the game won, Danny Donovan the latest recruit to the pitching staff, went in and twirled two innings Donovan hails from Bangor and has been at McAdam for some time. He has pitched for semi-pro teams in Maine and during the short time he performed yesterday looked good. He made a big hit with the crowd and seems a good investment. In the ninth he put three Bangor men away by the strike-put route and was found for one hit in each of the two innings.

THAT NEAR BLOW-UP.

Bangor got busy right at the start. Tewhey was thrown out by Callahan but Connaughton hit safely and scored on Matthews' hit. Cooney also got a hit but Hart flied out and the side was retired. In the third Bangor came near piling up a big score, the Pets' infield looking very wobbly. Callahan started with an error on Tewhey's drive. Keaney did likewise with Connaughton's Bobba Conley not to be outdone, dropped a throw to catch Tewhey at third. Things looked bad but they brightened up when Tewhey was thrown out trying to score on Boardman's drive to Conley. Matthews fanned and Cooney hit to Conley for a neat double-play--Conley to Murphy to Stone. It was a very nasty hole but the Pets climbed out O. K. After that there was nothing to it.

FREDERICTON'S END.

Fredericton took to Cooney's pitch-

ing like a duck to water, his control not working to any vast extent. In the first Keaney was safe when Hart dropped a fly in left-field. Keaney stole second. Wakefield threw to catch him but Tewhey was asleep at the switch and the ball went to centre-field and Keaney to third. Ganley singled, scoring Keaney. Dugan hit safely but was thrown out at second by Tewhey when Stone hit to him, Ganley scoring. A double-play ended the inning.

In the third Frank Keaney hammered out a home-run. Ganley flied out but P. J. Dugan came along with a two-base hit and scored on Stone's single. In the fifth the other tally came across. Keaney was safe when Dutton dropped Tewhey's throw. He stole second and went to third on the putout of Ganley. Dugan hit to Tewhey, who made an error and Keaney scored. "P. J." was thrown out by Wakefield stealing second.

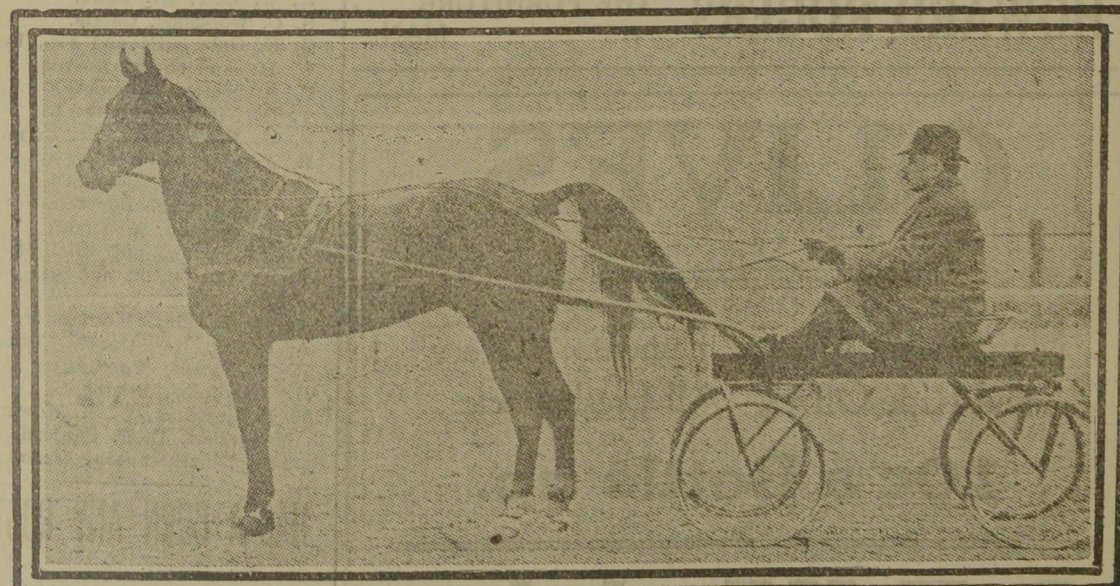

UHLAN FAILED TO LOWER MARK



UHLAN C.K.G. BILLINGS DRIVING.

Goshen, N. Y., Aug. 19.--A crowd of 10,000 turned out to attend the first day's trotting races here today.

The champion trotter Uhlán, driven by "Doc" Tanner, went against his own world's record of 2:02½ over a half-mile track, but owing to an accident failed to beat the record, covering the mile in 2:03½.

After scoring twice Tanner was sent away, with a runner as pace

maker. The first quarter was trotted in 30½, half in 59½.

After passing the half-mile post, going round the turn, Uhlán struck his quarter boot, causing him to stumble and strike against the rail of the fence. Tanner soon had the black whirlwind on his stride again, and he went to the three-quarter pole in 1:32½ and finished the mile

in 2:03½, considered by many horse-men equal to 2:01, owing to the mishap.

C. K. G. Billings, owner of Uhlán, was present and told the judges that he would allow Uhlán to go again on Thursday afternoon. It is confidently expected that the mark of 2:02½, made here two years ago by the champion, will be then beaten.
