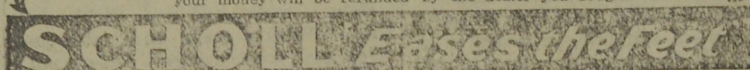

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A CARPENTER WHO REFUSED TO BE HELD UP

Strange Story Told by Holly Stewart
---Got a Job at the Barracks
But Lost it Within a Week

Because he refused to pay tribute to a member of the Blair family of St. Mary's, Mr. Holly Stewart, a carpenter who has been working at the barracks, found himself out of a job one day this week. Mr. Stewart, it seems, had been employed at the Gem Theatre at a wage of two dollars a day, which he deemed insufficient for his services and asked for an increase which was refused. He quit the job and was soon afterwards approached by one Charles Blair of St. Mary's, who promised to get him a job at the Soldier's Barracks at \$2.50 per day. Blair gave him to understand that his brother was in charge of some repair work and that he (Stewart) would get \$2.50 per day all right. Mr. Stewart went to work there last week and on Saturday night was paid off at the rate of \$2.50 per day. Soon afterwards the Good Samaritan who had got him the job once more appeared on the scene. He enquired of Stewart if he had been paid at the rate of \$2.50 per day and on being answered in the affirmative, he coolly demanded that he be given a rake-off of twenty-five cents per day. Mr. Stewart, feeling that he had earned the money paid to him, and that the demand of Blair was a most unreasonable one, stoutly refused to be held up. After promising that "he would see about it,"

Wanted by Authorities of Old Town, Me., for Serious Offence---Was Working on Highway Bridge
---Will go Back

Joseph Cyr was arrested by Chief McCollom last evening on advice received from the town marshal of Old Town, Me., charged with assault. The offense in the communication, is said to be a serious one and to have occurred August 9. Cyr admitted to the police when arrested that he had trouble with a man at Old Town and said he was willing to go back and stand trial.

Cyr arrived here about a week ago and went to work for The Foundations Company on the draw-span of the Highway Bridge. Circulars were sent out from Old Town giving the man's description and aliases, Joseph Cyr, John Cyr and John Joseph Martin.
