UNDER THE HEADING "BAD IMPERIALISM," AN EDITORIAL IN THE LONDON DAILY NEWS AND LEADER OF MARCH 8TH, WHICH HAS BEEN IN CLOSE TOUCH WITH ADMIRAL LORD FISHER, BRITAIN'S GREATEST NAVAL EXPERT, SAYS:—"MR. BORDEN WOULD SEEM TO STAND ALONE AMONG THE STATEMEN OF THE DOMINION, AND THE LEAST CONCESSION HE CAN MAKE IS TO CONSULT THE PEOPLE OF CANADA BEFORE HE COMMITS THEM TO A CONSTITUTIONAL REVOLUTION CONDEMNED BY ALL THE OTHER DOMINIONS. FAR FROM DOING THAT, IT IS STATED THAT HE MEANS TO FORCE THE NAVAL BILL THROUGH BY INTRODUCING THE CLOSURE. THE FIRST FRUIT, THEREFORE, IS A DOMESTIC CRISIS IN CANADA OF THE FIRST MAGNITUDE. WE HAVE FROM THE FIRST CRITICIZED THE SUBSTANCE OF THE BORDEN SCHEME ON CONSTITUTIONAL GROUNDS. WE HAVE REPEATEDLY INSISTED THAT IT WAS DOING AN ILL SERVICE TO THE EMPIRE TO MAKE THE NAVY AN ISSUE BETWEEN THE PARTIES IN THE DOMINIONS. NOW THAT MR. BORDEN'S SCHEME HAS BEEN PUSHED TO THE POINT OF AN ACUTE POLITICAL CRISIS IN CANADA, IT WILL BE AGREED BY ALL RATIONAL MINDS THAT IT IS DOING THE WORST OF SERVICES TO IMPERIAL UNITY."

TORY LEADERS POOR SPORTS

The last thing in the world that the Tories want at the present time is an election. They know that they won the last contest by false and disgraceful canvasses and they are hoping against hope that a way will be found out of the difficulty which now confronts them at Ottawa. Men who waved the old flag vigorously in the last contest and proclaimed their loyalty from the house-tops are now found sitting cheek by jowl with Nationalists who not very long ago went about the country declaring that they had to "shoot the British flag full of holes in order to breathe the air of liberty." They are able to condone the humiliating back-down of their party in parliament a few nights ago, when an effort was made to shut off discussion on the naval bill; and they would be even willing to abandon the emergency naval bill rather than submit the issue to the people. In fact, about the only joy the average Tory experiences these days over political matters is when he heard or reads the frequent announcement of some parliamentary follower of Mr. Borden that there is no probability of an early election over the naval bill.

Only a few days ago, Mr. C. DeW. Foster, Tory M.P. for Kings, N.S., addressed a meeting of his supporters at Kentville, and The Halifax Recorder tells us that his announcement that there would be no election over the naval bill was greeted by thunderous and prolonged applause, and says The Recorder, "every man breathed freer and smiles came out on every countenance as sunlight breaks through the clouds and brightens the landscape on a day of mist and gloom."

It will be remembered that Mr. O. S. Crockett, M.P., while on a recent visit to his home, rushed into print to tell the faithful that there would be no election. The local Tory organ tells its readers almost daily that "the Liberals have thrown up the sponge," realizing that it is the most joyful news it can convey to its readers at the present time.

The Tory fears are certainly well grounded. They know that they obtained power eighteen months ago under false pretences, and they know that they will have to walk the plank just as soon as the people get a chance at them. The dissolution of parliament at the present time would simply mean a summons to the

Tories to attend their own funeral. Is it any wonder that they are anxious to postpone the evil day as long as possible? The average Tory politician is the worst kind of a sport.

The great Sir John Macdonald, who knew a few things about the political game, used to say that there was nothing so uncertain as a horse race and an election. The Tory Woodstock Press, which apparently knows more about the political game than Sir John ever did, has made the discovery that if an election were held in Carleton County at the present time, Mr. Carvell, M.P., would be defeated by several hundred votes. Mr. Carvell is one of the outstanding figures of the present parliament; he is by long odds the ablest man that Carleton ever sent to Ottawa and if the people of his native county should be so unwise as to withdraw their confidence from him at the next election there are at least a dozen other constituencies in Canada which will be only too glad to avail themselves of his valuable services. The Press, however, is a very poor prophet; it predicted Mr. Carvell's defeat in 1904, 1908 and 1911, but on all three occasions he was triumphantly elected and he will be elected again.

Mr. Albion R. Foster, who is generally recognized as one of the most efficient peace officers in the province, has been dismissed from the office of provincial constable by the salary-grabbing Flemming government. Mr. Foster has never been in jail, he has never been bailed to court charged with a criminal offence. This cannot be said of some of the provincial constables appointed by the Flemming government. Mr. Foster's only offence is that he is a Liberal.

The company of which Mr. Richard O'Leary is a leading light, seems to have landed a soft thing from the Tory government in the form of a dredging contract. Mr. O'Leary was the organizer for the Tories in the North Shore counties at the last local election and some people are still wondering where all the money came from. Hon. Dr. Pugsley threw some light on the subject in parliament on Tuesday.

Having repealed some of its bad legislation at the recent session of the House, the Flemming government has given further evidence of its own incompetency by dismissing two provincial constables which it appointed to office. The government has made the discovery that these men are unfit for the position. Other people were aware of this at the time they were appointed.

The new secretary of the St. John Board of Trade has advised the merchants of that city to cut out promiscuous advertising. He says that money spent for advertising on concert and society programs is thrown away. In that he is absolutely correct as many business men in this and other cities know to their cost. The most effective method of advertising is through the newspapers.

The manufacturers who pooled in so heavily for the Tories at the last election with the understanding that they would have certain tariff concessions would probably not welcome an election at the present time. The goods have not yet been delivered.

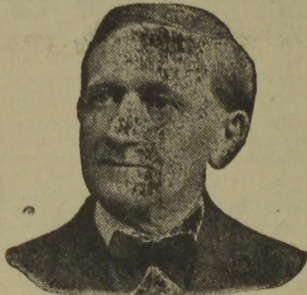

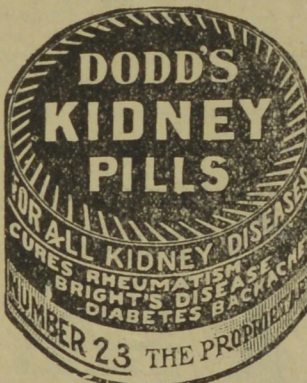
Mr. Jesse Keen, who recently removed from St. Mary's to Olympia, Wash., is seriously ill from heart trouble at that place.

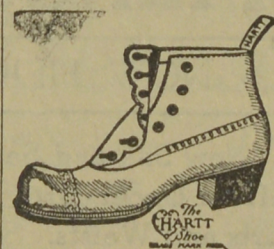
