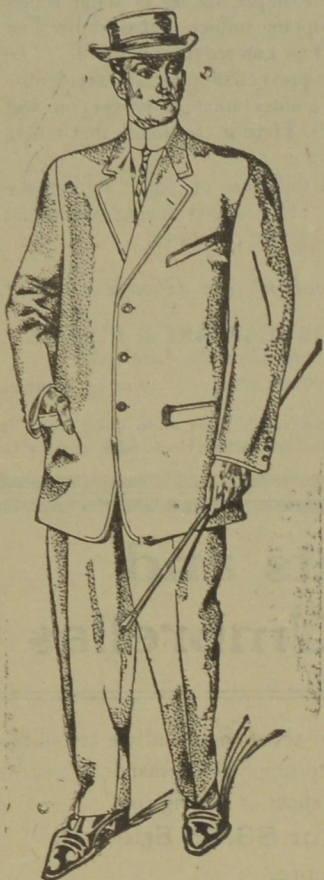

### RED SOX ARE CUT DOWN TO TWENTY-SIX MEN

Several More to be Farmed out---  
Hospital List is Large---Joe Martin  
In Bad

T. H. Munroe writing to the Boston Globe from Hot Springs, Ark., sizes the Red Sox up as follows:

To me Manager Jake Stahl looks stale, iron overwork, but he will soon come back to himself after he works his way north.

Scott the youthful shortstop from Youngstown has been farmed out to Mike Kelly's Indianapolis club of the American Association, and will leave for there in a day or two. This will bring the number of Boston players down to 26 or one more than the club can carry on the opening day of the season.

As the team will only carry four outfielders and the men who finished strong last year are all in good shape, young Walsh, the Fall River player will no doubt be farmed out. The youngster looks promising and worth keeping a string on.

The Red Sox will not carry all of the extra infielders. Of these there are Janvin, Ball, Carlstrom and Engle. The latter is a useful man, as he can play the outfield or any infield position and makes the ideal all-round substitute. Janvin is a winner. Ball is a veteran and a superb ground-coverer and Carlstrom has more than met all expectations.

The four young pitchers will be given plenty of time to show their goods.

### RAS MURPHY STAR OF SECOND GAME AT BOSTON ARENA

Mike Murphy Drew Only Penalty of  
Game---Chester Gregory as  
Good as Ever

A despatch on the second New Glasgow-Tecumseh game at Boston published in the Halifax papers is as follows:

To Morrison's great work in the cage the New Glasgow's owe their supremacy. The Toronto forwards lost out on several easy shots through over confidence. Ras Murphy again proved the shining light of the evening, and Chester Gregory also played to his form of Saturday.

But one penalty was meted out, Mike Murphy drawing in a five minutes lay off for poking George McNamara in the nose with his stick. Three fifteen minute periods were played. It took Cully Wilson but a minute to score the only goal of the first period. Lowther drew first blood for the Cuts in 1.15 of the second session. Two minutes later Gregory scored unassisted. To duplicate this feat it took him but 15 seconds. Steve Vair scored later in the same session, and had a hand in George McNamara's goal tying the score. With a trifle over four minutes of the closing period tolled off, Vair broke loose and slipped in what proved the winning tally.

The Boston Post says: "Ras" Murphy, who played cover point for the New Glasgow aggregation, was in large measure responsible for his team's success. With the possible exception of the famous Hobe Baker, no player has created such a fine impression at the Arena all season as this speedy Maritime star. Time and again, by dazzling speed and clever dribbling, he succeeded in evading the Tecumseh forwards and defence men and aimed many a vicious shot at the opposing cage."

### TY COBB'S TEAM CAUSES TROUBLE IN SOUTH

Ty Cobb's A.L.-Georgian team is having trouble arranging games with the clubs now training in the south. The fiat has gone forth from baseball headquarters that any club in organized ball which plays against the outlaws will be automatically suspended and the players fined \$100 each. President Solomon, of the Newark club, tried to induce the Indians to play Cobb's outfit, but they refused, and Manager Smith and Solomon had a wordy argument over the matter. Smith intimated very plainly to the president of the club that Savannah wasn't big enough to hold both of them at this time, and the manager further told Solomon that he would brook no interference of kind. He informed Solomon that he did not want him to bother the players in any way, and would be better pleased if he did not speak to them, except when absolutely necessary. As a consequence of this and other troubles, Solomon left the town in disgust and reports are to the effect that the Newark club is in grave danger of disruption.

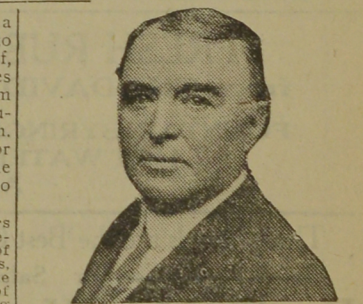
