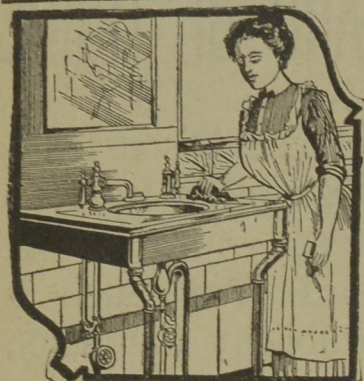

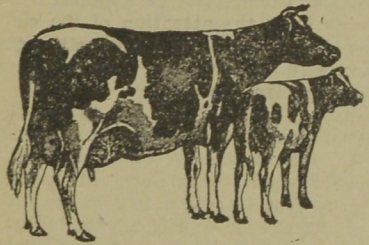

It is realized that to have withdrawn the bill would have been confessing defeat, and it is considered that Mr. Borden has chosen the best way out of a difficult situation. Interest is now centred on the action of the senate, which it is thought will probably bring about a constitutional crisis.
