C. H. Wheeler of Houlton Wants to Lease Track for July Meeting--Small Credit Balance Reported by Treasurer--Directors to Meet Again on Wednesday--Secretaryship Now Vacant

The matter of holding racing meets during the season at the local track is yet to be decided but the Fredericton Park Association made a start last night when a special meeting was held at the request of five directors, the annual meeting having been postponed from January. Directors were elected. The new directorate, after holding a short session, adjourned to meet Wednesday.

The feature of the meeting was the retirement of three of the directors and the election of three others to take their places. Although there is some uncertainty with regard to race meets it is practically assured that there will be racing in connection with the exhibition, September 15 to 20, and there also is a possibility of a mid-summer meet.

President A. B. Kitchen was in the chair and J. A. Edwards acted as secretary. Other stockholders present were T. V. Monahan, H. C. Jewett, G. C. McCoy, J. D. Black, Hugh O'Neill, J. H. Fleming, D. McCathrin, T. S. Wilkinson, H. J. Morgan, J. S. Allen.

The report of the treasurer, J. Hugh Calder, who was absent, was presented. It showed that the July meeting of 1912 had been run at a

loss but that during the Old Home Week, August 5 to 10, the meet had shown a gain, the net result of the two being a gain slightly under \$200. Against that surplus were a number of overhead charges, the largest of which was \$150 for rent. The total operations of the season of 1912 left to the credit of the association a very small balance but there are some outstanding accounts. The report of the treasurer also mentioned the fact that C. H. Wheeler of Houlton, Me., had made an offer to lease the track to put on a race-meeting in July. The report was placed on file.

When the election of directors came before the meeting H. C. Jewett, J. A. Edwards and T. V. Monahan retired from the board. Those directors who were re-elected are A. B. Kitchen, J. H. Calder, J. A. Allen, Hugh O'Neill, D. McCathrin, J. H. Fleming. New directors elected are H. G. Kitchen, Dr. G. C. McCoy and H. J. Morgan.

J. A. Edwards, who was acting secretary last year, being out of the city much of the time, has requested that he be relieved of the duties of the office and a secretary must be appointed.

FIVE GOOD MEETS FOR NEW ENGLAND THIS SEASON

Rockingham, Brockton, Lewiston, Augusta and Bangor on the List--Entries Close This Week

Owners and trainers in New England will this week be called upon to lend their support to five home meetings, the Grand Circuit at Rockingham, the Brockton Fair and Lewiston, Augusta and Bangor in the Pine Tree Circuit.

Rockingham is sure to get all of the big line material in this section, but the follow-up and half-mile tracks should not overlook the two classes which the management at Salem gives for horses not up to Grand Circuit standard.

These events are of \$2000 value and are for 2.17 pacers and 2.24 trotters that have not started in a circuit race previous to the opening day at Rockingham.

The 3-year-old should also provide a soft spot for animals shy of first flight speed, as it is given for those youngsters not starting in the American Horse Breeder Futurity, which is to be a feature of the Rockingham program.

Rockingham has dropped its entrance fee in all classes to 3 per cent. and has fixed on a very small payment when entries close on Wednesday.

Brockton offers its usual splendid list of early classes, eight \$1000 purses. Nominations also close then for the Brockton Fair Futurity, a \$5000 for foals of 1913.

The classes closing for the Maine Circuit are the 2.10 pacer, 2.27 trotting and 2.20 pacer. In the 2.20 pace at Lewiston the purse is \$10,000, and at Bangor and Augusta \$5000. The trotters have a \$5000 purse in each city and the 2.10 pacers \$2000.

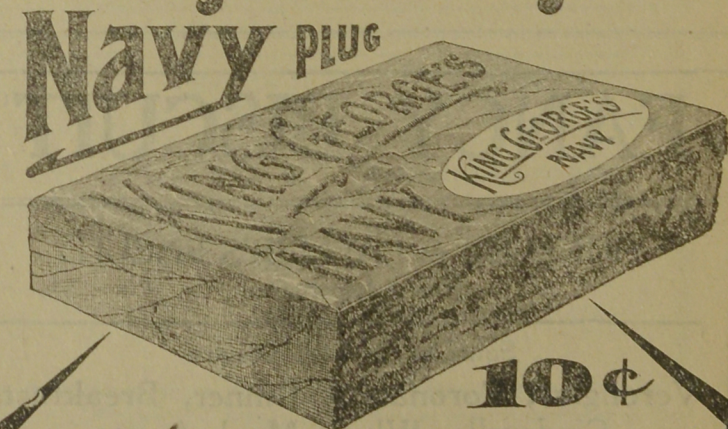
