FOX BREEDING CRAZE SHOWS NO ABATEMENT

Charlottetown, P.E.I., April 14—About half of the thirty bills which have come before the Legislature so far this season were bills incorporating black fox companies. The fever shows no signs of subsiding, but is steadily rising. All over the Island pups are beginning to arrive in the ranches and as this season promises to be more favorable for production than last and as the prospects of big dividends float before the eyes of the investors, more and more fuel is being fed to the flames of excitement.

The fact that the stock in the Charles Dalton Company, Limited, was over subscribed by \$20,000 and that offers are now being received from the other provinces to buy shares at a premium of 20 per cent., is also acting as a spur for further investment.

A number of fox exchanges are being organized and an effort is to be made to have the Dalton stock listed in the New York or Montreal exchanges. So far attention has been paid mainly to the blacks and silvers, with some patches and reds, but recently the blues have been introduced and several companies organized to breed the animals of this color are applying for incorporation.

The sounds of a coming boom in the oyster industry are also in the air. Practically all the barren bottom in Richmond Bay, the home of the famous Malpeques, has been leased and quite a number of companies have been organized.

"RUB IT IN"

FIRST ANNIVERSARY OF GREATEST OCEAN DISASTER

(Montreal Star)

Standing out darker than any other day of disaster in our time, April 15, which comes around next Tuesday, will long remain a day of mourning. Memories of the loss of the Titanic one year ago are still too vivid in the minds of countless people to recall without a shudder.

So unreal do the glaring facts of that manifold tragedy come back to us after twelve short months, so ghastly were the details, that people with difficulty grasp the event as an actual happening of recent history; rather, it now seems like a nightmare that gripped and tortured the people of the world for whole and nights of terror and unrest.

Yet next Tuesday marks the first anniversary of the day when the news was flashed by wireless that the mammoth liner, "Titanic," the pride of the ocean, on her maiden voyage had crashed against a mountain of ice, and that she, the "unsinkable monster," had sunk under the waves forever, bearing down 1,630 people with her.

Montreal had more reason to be prostrated than any of the continent outside of New York, when the tragic significance of that brief message first struck the people like a thunderbolt. Railway officials and employees still mourn a resourceful railroad general; bankers, city hall officials and the public generally regret the untimely death of a prominent financier, a former alderman and a public-spirited citizen; two other financiers were cut off practically in their prime, casting gloom over "the street," and each victim left prominent families in the city bereaved. Truly, Montrealers had reason to gasp with horror when they realized the extent of the disaster and how it had struck home to them.

Alone among her bereaved-sister cities, this one stood out in the fact that not one Montreal man among the passengers survived Charles M. Hays, H. Markland Molson, Thornton Davidson, and J. H. Davidson, Quigley Baxter and Vivian Payne, with the other Montrealers, parted from their loved ones who were saved and stood dumbfounded on the decks as the great ship went down. This record of heroism on the part of Montreal men contributed one ray to lessen the tragic gloom; the fact that they all died like men lightened the stories of pathos and panic, of brutality and cowardice which were afterwards showered down upon the world by the survivors.

Montreal, too, was the city to receive the first wireless flash that the Titanic had struck an iceberg. That was at 1 a. m. on April 15, when Mr. George Hannan, passenger agent of the Allen line, opened a wireless despatch received from one of the Allan liners on the ocean, transmitting the Titanic's despairing call for help.

"Come at once. We've struck a berg. It's a C. D. O. call, old man."

That's the way the fateful message read. And at 1 a. m. that morning Mr. Hannan called up a Montreal newspaper man. Had he not done so, not a single newspaper in the world would have gone to press that morning with a line about the disaster which proved to be the story of the age.

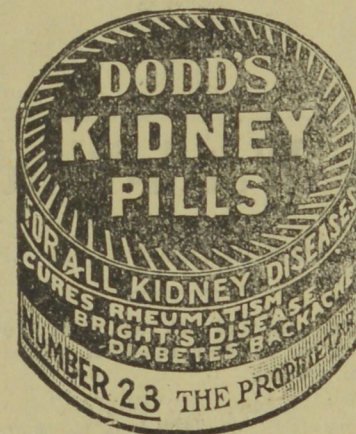

HOW NEWS REACHED PUBLIC

New York was figuratively slumbering after a quiet Sunday night's news-gathering when Montreal in turn flashed the startling news to the Associated Press office in New York. Consternation and chaos prevailed when that brief despatch reached New York in the early morning for no newspaper dared publish the astounding news till they could get some information from off the ocean.

Then the wireless instruments cracked and flashed as the operators feverishly flared forth messages in a wild effort to reach Cape Race where a lonely wireless station looked out on the cold Atlantic. At last the wireless operator there flung back his reply confirming the call for help—the Titanic had sent out.

But there was not one word, not even a thought of the terrible death list when the newspapers came out announcing the accident that morning. The great Titanic was unsinkable people said, and wireless after wireless message poured into Montreal and New York that she was being towed safely into Halifax, long

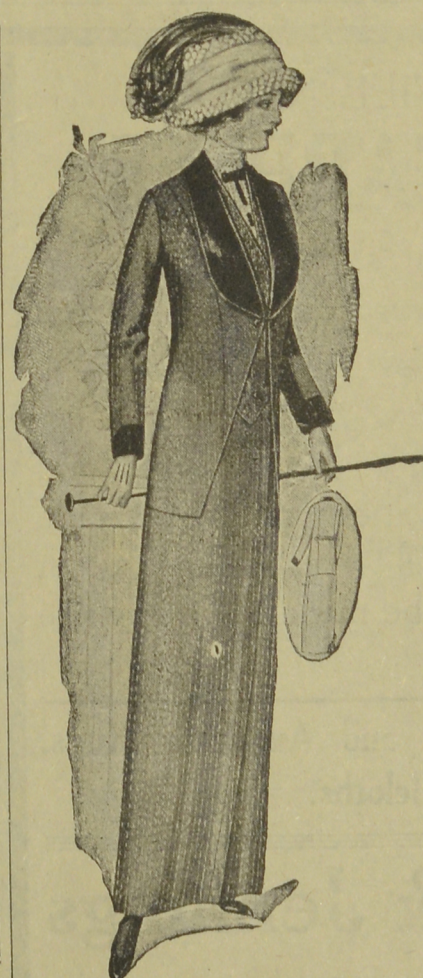


Harry's Cafe IS ON Westmorland Street

after the mighty liner with her human freight had sunk forever.

What first puzzled the world was the terrible silence on the part of the Titanic's wireless instrument after the sole message she had sent out for aid. Flashes were received that the gallant ship Carpathia was racing to her assistance; Allan liners further off the course sent in similar news but the Titanic's instrument had called once and then forever remained silent.

WHEN FULL NEWS FIRST CAME.

Not until the evening shortly after seven o'clock on April 16 did the announcement of more than 1,000 deaths reach Montreal or any other city. Days and nights followed in which the public of two continents waited in feverish anxiety for the meagre news that filtered through the air. Hope survived in the hearts

of many when they heard of the rescue performed by the Carpathia, but few knew who was saved or who was lost until the next morning by which time the Carpathia's wireless operator slowly tapped in the names of the lost and the living as the steamer headed onward towards New York. Thus it was that early after the first appalling announcement had arrived it was learned that among those who had gone down were Wil-
